We had the pleasure of joining thirty some people at our daughter's home (member Christina Kimmerling). Loads of fun!

The junior program continues to roll along. We had eighty three kids in the Fall program— from learning to sail to high school classes. Director of Sailing Stephen Long is planning courses for beginner and intermediate sailors in Cubes; Opti Green and Opti Champ classes; a double handed program featuring CFJs; a singlehanded program in ILCAs (fka Lasers), and a robust high school program. Sign ups are open now through January 17 with the first classes starting February 1— encourage family and friends to join the fun!

One of the goals of the program this year is to increase junior participation at SCYYRA regattas and also at ABYC regattas. You might have noticed two classes of Optis sailing in the Bay at the Turkey Day Regatta, as well as 29er, ILCA 4 and ILCA 6 classes in the ocean (the latter class having ABYC juniors scoring 1 and 2).

Another goal is to add newer equipment to the program. The Alamitos Bay Sailing Foundation acquired two new CFJs and two new C420s which are being chartered to the junior program. These boats will be very competitive. The program also received the benefit of donations of four recent vintage ILCAs, bringing the program total to seven.

Expect a very robust ILCA training program this spring and summer.

All of the accomplishments of the junior program would not be possible without the hard work of Stephen, the instructors and the Junior Advisory Committee. Thank you to John Ferri, Craig Farmer, Carrie Yuri, Kathleen Melvin, Suzanne Swezea, John McCaleb, Regine Smet and Mike Oliver for their service on the JAC.

And don't forget adult sailing. We will again have four sessions in 2023 using the Tempests resulting in ASA certification for participants; and a new group program intended to be a relaxed and fun introduction to sailing. We hope to grow significantly the number of adults leaning to sail at the Club.

There has been so much junior sailing since the last Sou'Wester; I'll try to keep it short.

ISSA, Interscholastic Sailing Association had their first National Championship of the year, hosting the High School Singlehanded Nationals on Halloween weekend. **Tate Christopher** finished 7th in the 18 boat ILCA 7 fleet. There were two junior sailors in the top ten of the 18 boat ILCA 6 fleet. **Nicholas Mueller** finished 4th and **Morgan Pinckney** finished 8th.

That same weekend, the ABYC Opti team traveled up to Santa Barbara for their first SCYYRA event of the year. The first Carrie series regatta is the Halloween regatta, and we had 6 sailors in Champ Fleet, and **Harper Swezea** finished 13th out of 38 in Green Fleet. **Gage Christopher** was able to represent ABYC on the podium with his 3rd place finish! **Theo Goodman** finished 19th, **Cassady Lorentzen** finished 26th, **Beckett Christensen** finished 27th, **Henry Day** finished 32nd, and **Michio Ferri** finished 42nd in the 43 boat Champ Fleet.

The first weekend of November was the Junior Commodore regatta at Mission Bay Yacht Club. This regatta was the second Ullman/Frost regatta, and ABYC had three participants in the 34 boat fleet. **Nicholas Mueller** was able to win the event with four first place finishes in seven races. **Tommy Kraak** finished 5th place and **Victoria Messano** finished 28th.

The second week of November our junior sailors had their choice of two regattas. Our high school sailors attended the second high school nationals qualification regatta at Newport Harbor Yacht Club. We had three teams

in the Silver Fleet. The Los Al team (**Stewart McCaleb/Luke Pinto and Mathilde Smith/Anielka Schuler**)

finished 6th, Sato/McBride (**Jack McGhie/Ryan Hollmeier and Preston Woodworth/Jessica Green**) finished 9th, and St John Bosco (**Jack Snow/Tanner Swager/Roman Galindo and Samuel Mohinani/Michael Beaird**) finished 28th out of 32 teams.

Our Opti sailors attended the second Carrie series regatta in Ventura on the second week of November. **Gage Christopher** finished 2nd, **Timothy Liu** finished 12th, **Theo Goodman** finished 17th, **Cassady Lorentzen** finished 18th, and **Lin Zhou** finished 24th in the 29 boat fleet. **Michio** and **Hikari Ferri** sailed in the green fleet.

The third weekend of November was our very own Turkey Day regatta. The Opti fleet had ten participants all for ABYC—Terrific turnout! In Champ fleet, **Theo Goodman** took first place, **Eric Panebianco** came in second, **JP Panebianco** was 3rd, and **Olive Ferrara** was 4th. **Henry Day** won Green Fleet, **Beckett Christensen** came in 2nd, **Harper Swezea** finished 3rd, **Ari Glatstein** finished 4th, **Hikari Ferri** finished 5th, and **Brooke Swezea** finished 6th. ABYC had four junior sailors in the ILCA 6 fleet. **Nicholas Mueller** won the regatta and a turkey. **Tommy Kraak** was only three points behind in second, also winning a turkey. **Miachel Sentovich** finished 8th, and **Tanner Jolly** finished 14th in the 23 boat ILCA 6 fleet.

mark's racing rules quiz #97

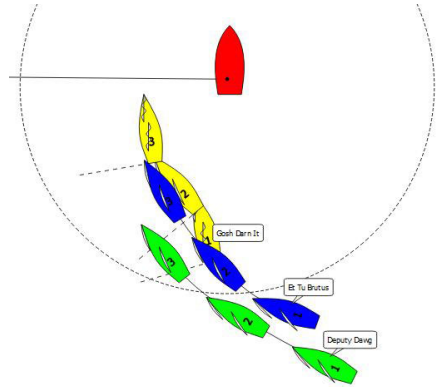

Gosh Darn It, Et Tu Brutus and Deputy Dawg were approaching the starting line to start on starboard tack in 14-15 knotsof wind and medium chop. Gosh Darn It was to weather within a boat length of the committee boat. Et Tu Brutus and Deputy Dawg were clear astern. Gosh Darn It was early for the start and was fish tailing to kill speed. Et Tu Brutus sailing faster became overlapped to leeward of Gosh Darn It's port stern quarter. When Gosh Darn It altered course to windward there was contact with Et Tu Brutus on her port stern quarter causing damage. Both boats hailed protest, displayed a red flag and subsequently filed a hearing request.

Et Tu Brutus claimed that there was plenty of space when the overlap was established and Gosh Darn It didn't attempt to luff and keep clear for more than 10 seconds. Deputy Dawg couldn't tell exactly when the overlap occurred or the gap when they became overlapped but thought there was sufficient time and space for Gosh Darn It to keep clear. Gosh Darn It claimed that Et Tu Brutus became overlapped close to leeward and when they altered course to windward there was immediate contact.

At the start the race committee were unable to identify boats that are on the course side of the starting line and signaled a general recall.

How should the protest committee rule? See if you can figure out the relevant facts, conclusions, and decision.

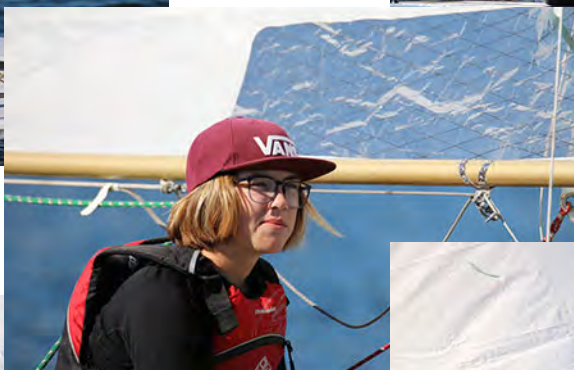

Both Gosh Darn It and Et Tu Brutus filed hearing requests. The two hearing requests should be heard together in accordance with Rule 63.2 since both hearings arose from the same incident. (See WS Case 49)

When considering conflicting testimony, the protest committee shall give the weight it considers appropriate to the evidence presented. The witness on Gosh Darn It was at the stern of the boat, well positioned to see when the boats became overlapped, the gap between the boats and the contact. The witness on Et Tu Brutus was at the stern of the boat not well positioned to see when the boats became overlapped. The witness on Deputy Dawg was behind Et Tu Brutus and further from the point of contact. When one witness is better positioned than another to determine the relative position of the boats, the committee shall give the weight it considers appropriate to the evidence presented. (See WS Case 136)

When Et Tu Brutus becomes overlapped to leeward of Gosh Darn It, she obtains right of way over Gosh Darn It under rule 11, On the Same Tack, Overlapped. When rule 11 begins to apply between Et Tu Brutus and Gosh Darn It, Et Tu Brutus is initially required by rule 15, Acquiring Right of Way, to give Gosh Darn It room to keep clear, the space and time for response, and thus a fair opportunity to maneuver to keep clear. Et Tu Brutus's obligation under rule 15 is not a continuing one; it protects Gosh Darn It only temporarily, and only if Gosh Darn It responds promptly after the overlap begins (see the definition Room). If Gosh Darn It does so but some part of her hull, crew or equipment touches any part of Et Tu Brutus's hull, crew or equipment, Gosh Darn It breaks rule 11. If contact occurs despite Gosh Darn It having luffed in a seamanlike way, Et Tu Brutus breaks rule 15 by not giving Gosh Darn It room to keep clear, and Gosh Darn It is exonerated by rule 43.1(b) for her breach of rule 11. However, if Gosh Darn It luffs higher than is necessary to keep clear of Et Tu Brutus and, as a result, causes contact with Et Tu Brutus, Gosh Darn It has been given the room required by rule 15 and is not exonerated. (See WS Case 24)

Although Et Tu Brutus caused damage, it was not serious damage (See WS Case 19 and 141), so under rule 36(b) she is not penalized because the race was recalled.

CONCLUSIONS

1. Hearing No. 1 was heard together with Hearing No. 2 in accordance with RRS 63.2 since both hearings arose from the same incident.

2. Gosh Darn It to windward failed to keep clear of Et Tu Brutus to leeward, and broke RRS 11.

3. When acquiring right of way through her own actions, Et Tu Brutus failed to initially give Gosh Darn It room to keep clear, and broke RRS 15.

4. Et Tu Brutus, the right-of-way boat, did not avoid contact when it was reasonably possible, and broke RRS 14.

5. It was not reasonably possible for Gosh Darn It, to avoid contact with Et Tu Brutus when it was clear that Et Tu Brutus was not giving room. Gosh Darn It did not break RRS 14.

6. Since Gosh Darn It broke a rule of Section A while she was sailing within the room to which she was entitled, she is exonerated under RRS 43.1(b) for this breach.

7. Since the race was restarted and Et Tu Brutus had caused neither injury nor serious damage, she shall not be penalized as per RRS 36(b).

DECISION

1. Protest upheld. Since the provision of RRS 36(b) applies, no penalty is imposed on Et Tu Brutus.
