

B lue and Yellow are on port tack approaching the windward mark to be left to port. Yellow is to leeward and clear ahead of Blue when she reaches the zone.

As Yellow reaches the starboard layline she luffs and tacks to port and is then fetching the mark. After Yellow completes her tack Blue luffs, passes through head to wind and is above close-hauled as she passes the mark. Yellow luffs to avoid contact and protests.

Yellow protests claiming that Blue tacked too close and broke rule 13. There is no contact. Neither boat takes a penalty.

How should the protest committee rule? See if you can figure out the relevant facts, conclusions, and decision.

mark's rulesswer #81

t position 1, Yellow is clear ahead when she reaches the zone, Blue, the boat clear astern at that moment shall thereafter give her mark-room under rule 18.2(b).

At position 2, when Yellow passes head to wind from starboard to port, rule 18 ceases to apply between Yellow and Blue. See rule 18.1(a). When Yellow completes her tack to starboard and acquires right of way under rule 10, she is required to initially give Blue room to keep clear under rule 15.

At position 3, after Blue passes head to wind, rule 13 requires her to keep clear of other boats until she is on a closehauled course. However, after Blue passes head to wind, rule 18 begins to apply again because the boats are in the zone and no longer on opposite tacks and none of the exceptions in rule 18.1 apply. As they are overlapped, rule 18.2(a) begins to apply, and it requires Yellow, the outside boat, to give Blue, the inside boat, mark-room while the boats remain overlapped. Provided Blue, a boat entitled to mark-room, is sailing her proper course, she is sailing within the room to which she is entitled by rule 18.2(a) and will be exonerated under rule 43.1(b) if she breaks a rule of section A, rule 15, rule 16 or she is compelled to break rule 31.

CONCLUSIONS

 After passing head to wind and before being on a close-hauled course, Blue failed to keep clear of Yellow. Blue broke RRS 13.

2. Since Blue broke RRS 13, a rule of Section A while she was sailing within the mark-room to which she was entitled, she is exonerated under RRS 43.1(b) for this breach.

DECISION

1. Blue is exonerated for her breach of RRS 13.
