

## a note fromeila

Summer is fast approaching, and I am compelled to remind members of some rules of the club that would make things run smoother and a happier place to be at ABYC. Have you ever got in your car and discovered the car in front of you or behind you didn't leave the keys in the car and it is locked? How frustrating is that? Every member who parks in the lot should have an ABYC numbered decal sticker on the windshield and leave their keys in the car. Yard rule 2.2 Vehicle parking on the Club grounds shall be limited to those vehicles belonging to Club members upon which there is a proper parking decal. 2.3 Any motor vehicles shall be parked in designated spaces or elsewhere as directed by Club Management. Parked vehicles shall remain unlocked with keys left in the ignition or plainly visible or at the club office. In no event shall any vehicle be parked in the boat storage area. If you don't have a sticker on your windshield, please stop by the office to pick up a decal sticker. Please log into the member section of the website and familiarize yourself with the yard rules and the boat rules.

Since we don't have a hard copy of the roster, it's important to keep your information up to date. Have you moved, phone number changed, had a baby, got married, or purchased a new boat? All this information is located in the member section on the ABYC website. At the top of the page there's a tab "members info", then from the drop-down list select "membership roster" then select "edit your roster details". Here you can make changes to your information. Make sure you scroll to the bottom of the page and hit the update button to save your changes. In order to access the member section, you do have to know your member ID and your password. If you don't remember, or need help accessing the website call the office for help. You can also make reservations for club events.

The boat yard rules need to be followed and there have been many violations. Do you have a current DMV sticker on your boat, tires flat, boat cover in shreds, haven't sailed your boat in a while? These are violations and if you are guilty, it's a matter of time before you receive a violation letter. To keep from getting a violation letter, please come down to the club and inspect your boat or take it for a sail. Let me remind you of the rules:

- 3.4 All boats and trailers stored in yard moorings (except guests) must have an ABYC identification sticker permanently affixed so that it is visible and readable from the aisle. All boats required by law to be registered, must have a valid CF number and current registration sticker affixed to the boat.
- 3.5 All boats, other than those in Club racks (e.g. sabots, lasers), must be on trailers while in the storage area and be easily movable. Boats, trailers and covers must be in good state of repair and in operable condition. A reasonable time will be given to correct deficiencies. Failure to do so may result in a surcharge after notice. Any trailer found not to be in compliance with this rule is subject to eviction by the Board of Directors. The Club Management shall determine the type of trailers to be stored, and may reject any trailer deemed detrimental to Club property or of excessive dimensions for the class of boat stored. All trailers must have rubber-tired wheels and must have an adequate tongue wheel.
- 3.17 No boat covers, tarps, tools, maintenance equipment, racks, structures, or locker shall be left on the pavement, erected or stored in any place within the yard area. Wheel blocks and single upright member supports are excepted.
- 3.20 A yard-moored boat must be sailed at least once during each six-month period (Jan. 1 Jun. 30 and Jul. 1 Dec. 31) to retain yard storage privileges. Any boat found not to be in compliance with this rule is subject to immediate eviction by the Board of Directors. Any boat evicted from the yard for a second time for nonuse must wait one year from the date of the second eviction before the member may apply for another space in the yard.

These are just a few of the yard rules and most often violated. So come to enjoy your club and go sailing. Remember, be respectful, responsible and just relax because ABYC will always be the place to be.


## racing<sub>ules</sub> quiz #55

hree Tornado catamarans are on a downwind leg to a leeward gate. PLO (Yellow) on port, is outside and overlapped to leeward of PWM (Blue) on port. SI (Green) on starboard, is inside and overlapped with both boats and on a collision course, when PLO (Yellow) reaches the zone. PLO (Yellow) luffs to pass astern of SI (Green) and PWM (Blue) responds to the luff. When SI (Green) is one boat length passed the starboard gate mark she gybes to round the mark. PLO (Yellow) bears away as SI (Green) passes ahead of her and rounds inside of SI (Green). PWM (Blue) bears away gybes and follows SI (Green) and PLO (Yellow) around the mark. PWM (Blue) hails protest.

PLO (Yellow) claimed that SI (Green) was an obstruction to both PWM (Blue) and PLO (Yellow) and under rule 19.2(b) PWM (Blue) had to give PLO (Yellow) room to pass astern of SI (Green). After they passed astern of the obstruction, PLO (Yellow) gave PWM (Blue) room to round the mark.

Review the following rules; definition Obstruction, Mark-Room, rules 10, 11, 18.2(a), 18.2(b), 19, WS Case 63, WS Case 75, WS Case 118 and see if you can figure out the relevant facts, conclusions and decision.19.

came up and asked if we needed help and of course we said Yes! His name was Dan and I thank him profusely!


Rick Roberts and his crew of Sheila, Dwayne, and Damion deserve a round of applause for all the work they do as they go above and beyond!




## mother's dayunch

# drowning doesn'tok like drowning

ne of the first things I ever wrote for publication was a short article about drowning recognition for a Coast Guard magazine. A few years later, I adapted the piece for recreational boaters. I tried my best to get it published, but no one wanted it. *Reader's Digest* said it was "too dark," and everyone else (including *Soundings* magazine) simply ignored the submission.

Thanks to a friend of mine who had a blog, my piece on drowning was first posted eight years ago to the day in 2010. It went viral and crashed his website. Since then, it's been translated into 15 languages, was published in the *Washington Post*, and *Reader's Digest* eventually requested to buy the rights. After years of saying yes to requests to republish, repost and translate (there have been hundreds), I released the piece to the public domain. But I never got the article into a major boating magazine as I intended. Well, this is my blog, so I like my chances this time.

Summer is coming, folks, and I think the short article below is the most valuable thing I've put together, ever. I wanted to make sure followers of this blog have read it.



#### **Drowning Doesn't Look Like Drowning**

The new captain jumped from the deck, fully dressed, and sprinted through the water. A former lifeguard, he kept his eyes on his victim and headed straight for a couple who were swimming between their anchored sportfish and the beach. "I think he thinks you're drowning," the husband said to his wife. They had been splashing each other, and she had screamed,

but now they were just standing neck-deep on a sandbar. "We're fine, what is he doing?" she asked, a little annoyed. "We're fine!" the husband yelled, waving him off, but his captain kept swimming hard toward him. "Move!" he barked as he sprinted between the stunned owners. Directly behind them, not 10 feet away, their nine-year-old daughter was drowning. Safely above the surface in the arms of the captain, she burst into tears and screamed, "Daddy!"

How did this captain know — from 50 feet away — what the father couldn't recognize from just 10? Drowning is not the violent, splashing call for help that most people expect. The captain was trained to recognize drowning by experts and years of experience. The father, on the other hand, learned what drowning looks like by watching television.

If you spend time on or near the water (hint: that's all of us), then you should make sure that you and your crew know what to look for when people enter the water. Until she cried a tearful, "Daddy," the owner's daughter hadn't made a sound. As a former Coast Guard rescue swimmer, I wasn't surprised at all by this story. Drowning is almost always a deceptively quiet event. The waving, splashing and yelling that dramatic conditioning (television) prepares us to look for is rarely seen in real life.

The Instinctive Drowning Response, so named by Francesco A. Pia, Ph.D., is what people do to avoid actual or perceived suffocation in the water. And it does not look like most people expect it to. When someone is drowning there is very little splashing, and no waving or yelling or calling for help of any kind. To get an idea of just how quiet and undramatic drowning can be, consider this: It is the number two cause of accidental death in children age 15 and under (just behind vehicle accidents). Of the approximately 750 children who will drown next year, about 375 of them will do so within 25 yards of a parent or other adult. In 10 percent of those drownings, the adult will actually watch them do it, having no idea it is happening.

Drowning does not look like drowning. Dr. Pia, in an article he wrote for the Coast Guard's On Scene magazine, described the instinctive drowning response like this:

- Except in rare circumstances, drowning people are physiologically unable to call out for help. The respiratory system was designed for breathing. Speech is a secondary or overlaid function. Breathing must be fulfilled before speech occurs.
- Drowning people's mouths alternately sink below and reappear above the surface of the water. The mouths of drowning people are not above the surface of the water long enough for them to exhale, inhale and call out for help. When the drowning people's mouths are above the surface, they exhale and inhale quickly as their mouths start to sink below the surface of the water.
- Drowning people cannot wave for help. Nature instinctively forces them to extend their arms laterally and press down on the water's surface. Pressing down on the surface of the water permits drowning people to leverage their bodies so they can lift their mouths out of the water to breathe.
- Throughout the Instinctive Drowning Response, drowning people cannot voluntarily control their arm movements. Physiologically, drowning people who are struggling on the surface of the water cannot stop drowning and perform voluntary movements such as waving for help, moving toward a rescuer or reaching out for a piece of rescue equipment.
- From beginning to end of the Instinctive Drowning Response, people's bodies remain upright in the water, with no evidence of a supporting kick. Unless rescued by a trained lifeguard, these drowning people can only struggle on the surface of the water from 20 to 60 seconds before submersion occurs. (Source: On Scene magazine: Fall 2006 page 14)

This doesn't mean that a person who is yelling for help and thrashing isn't in real trouble — they are experiencing aquatic distress. Not always present before the instinctive drowning response, aquatic distress doesn't last long, but unlike true drowning, these victims can still assist in their own rescue. They can grab lifelines, reach for throw rings, etc.

#### Look for these other signs of drowning when persons are in the water:

Head low in the water, mouth at water level

Head tilted back with mouth open

Eyes glassy and empty, unable to focus

Eyes closed

Hair over forehead or eyes

Not using leas

Hyperventilating or gasping

Trying to swim in a particular direction but not making headway

Trying to roll over onto the back

Appears to be climbing an invisible ladder

So, if a crewmember falls overboard and everything looks okay, don't

be too sure. Sometimes the most common indication that someone is drowning



is that they don't look as if they're drowning. They may just look as if they are treading water and looking up at the deck. One way to be sure? Ask them, "Are you alright?" If they can answer at all, they probably are. If they return a blank stare, you may have less than 30 seconds to get to them. And parents — children playing in the water make noise. When they get quiet, you need to get to them and find out why.



he tricky part of this rules quiz is rule 19.1(b). Simply stated, PLO (Yellow) does not get to choose which side of SI (Green), an obstruction, she passes, as rule 19.1(b) has switched off rule 19.

At position 2 PLO (Yellow) is the right-of-way boat under rule 11 and when she luffs PWM (Blue) is required by rule 11 to keep clear, which she does. However, rule 18.2(b) limits PLO's (Yellow) actions as she is required to give PWM (Blue) mark-room, which includes room to sail to the mark, which she does not.

At position 3 and 4 when SI (Green) leaves space at the mark, PLO (Yellow) at her own risk took advantage of the space and as she kept clear did not break a rule. See World Sailing Case 63.

#### **FACTS**

1. When PLO (Yellow) on port reaches the zone for the port gate mark zone, PWM (Blue) on port has an inside overlap and SI (Green) on starboard is inside

and overlapped with both PLO (Yellow) and PWM (Blue).

- 2. PLO (Yellow) luffs to pass astern of SI (Green) and PWM (Blue) luffs to keep clear as required by rule 11.
- 3. SI (Green) gybes to port and then luffs to round the mark about one boat length to leeward of the mark.
- 4. PLO (Yellow) rounds the mark inside SI (Green).
- 5. PWM (Blue) has to gybe twice to leave the mark on the required side.
- 5. There is no contact between any of the boats.
- 6. No boat takes a penalty turn.

#### **CONCLUSIONS**

- 1. PLO (Yellow), outside overlapped at the zone, failed to give PWM (Blue) mark- room as required by 18.2(b).
- 2. Rule 18 applied between PLO (Yellow) and PWM (Blue), and the obstruction, SI (Green), was another boat overlapped with each of them. PLO (Yellow), the boat required to give mark-room, was not entitled to room at the obstruction as allowed by rule 19.2(b), because rule 19 does not apply per rule 19.1(b).

#### **DECISION**

1. PLO (Yellow) is DSQ for breaking rule 18.2(b).

## ...a lookack

ach year in May, our country celebrates the sacrifices of our military men and women with Arm Forces Week in the middle of May and Memorial Day the last Monday in May. ABYC members from the 1950s might remember a past member we can be very proud of. John "Mike" Wolf was an active member of ABYC in the late 1950s and early 1960s, sailing first a Thistle, then he and his family were early members in the new Lido 14 Class and later Cal 20s. Prior to joining ABYC, Mike graduated from Long Beach City College where he was Student Body President. Although Mike did well with a sailboat tiller in his hand, he really excelled in WWII flying F6F Hellcats from the flight deck of the USS Enterprise and USS Hornet in the Pacific during 1943 and 1944. The US military has the best pilots, but only the absolute best were given the distinction of being an Ace, in fact only 1450 have been designated as such from WWI, WWII, Korea and Vietnam. Pilots with 5 or more aerial victories were considered an Ace, Mike had 7! Three years ago in Washington DC, Mike and 26 other surviving Aces were honored at a Memorial Day Celebration on the Washington Mall receiving the Congressional Gold Medal. The same year Mike was also honored by LBCC as a distinguished alumni.

Today Mike is a healthy 98 year old living in Hansville Washington with his wife Carol, enjoying views of Puget Sound from his hillside home. He still reminisces with his family about the wonderful days sailing off the beach at the old club house. Mike exemplifies what Tom Brokaw calls "The Greatest Generation".
