

crew as a way to get involved. After all, sailing is what it's all about.



Are you racing yet? Are you yet a part of ABYC's most fun fleet? Find a boat, and join in on the fun! Glenn Selvin



ARBITRATION

- 1. Yellow and Blue accepted a post-race penalty at arbitration.
- 2. The arbitrator allowed the protest to be withdrawn in accordance with rule T4(b).

The arbitrators recommendation to the parties was that the matter should proceed to a hearing unless both of the protested boats wished to accept a post- race penalty, which both immediately did. The arbitration hearing did indicate that Yellow had broken a rule, but it was unclear if Blue had broken a rule.

Had the protest proceeded to a full protest the following would probably have been the outcome based upon the known facts and rules that apply.

Rule 13 While Tacking

Rule 18.3 Tacking in the Zone

Rule 19.2(b) Giving Room at an Obstruction

Rule 20.1(a) Hailing

Rule 21 Exoneration

Rule 31 Touching a Mark

CASE 27

CONCLUSIOSNS

- 1. Blue failed to hail for room to tack when they were approaching green, an obstruction, as required by rule 20.1. As Blue did not hail Yellow had no obligation to anticipate Blue's tack, Case 27.
 - 2. Yellow tacked at position 4 to avoid contact with Blue when it was clear that Blue was not keeping clear.
- 3. After passing head to wind and before being on a close-hauled starboard tack course, Blue failed to keep clear of Yellow on port tack, as required by rule 13.
 - 4. Yellow, the right-of-way boat avoided contact with Blue when it was clear that Blue was not keeping clear.
- 5. After passing head to wind from port tack to starboard tack inside the zone, Blue caused Green on starboard tack to sail above close-hauled to avoid contact, and broke rule 18.3.

DECISION

- 1. Blue is disqualified under rule 18.3 and rule 13.
- 2. Yellow was compelled to break rule 31 and is exonerated under RRS 21.

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
