## racing<sub>ules</sub> quiz #44

lue is sailing dead downwind towards the committee boat end of the finish line on starboard gybe. Yellow is also

sailing dead downwind towards the committee boat end of the finish line on starboard gybe. Yellows is clear astern of Blue. Yellows course is one boat length to leeward of Blue's. Red is sailing downwind towards the pin end of the finish line on port gybe. The pin end of the finish line is favored by about 1 boat length.


At position 2 Yellow becomes overlapped about a boat length to leeward of Blue. Yellow hails windward boat keep clear and luffs. Yellow does not respond to the luff.

Yellow continues to hail and at position 3 curtails her luff just before contact would have occurred. Yellow protests Blue under rule 11. Blue claims Yellow had a proper course limitation under rule 17.

Read the following rules and see how you would decide. Definitions, Proper Course

> Rule 11, On the Same Tack, Overlapped Rule 16.1, Changing Course Rule 17, On the Same Tack; Proper Course

#### y Experiences at the 2018 Laser North Americans

If I had to summarize Laser North Americans in a few words it would be: challenging, exciting, and rewarding. I began sailing 9 years ago, and have been seriously competing for the last 4 years. This was not my first international competition, but it was my first time racing lasers in a major regatta.

The regatta was very difficult for several reasons. A combination of extreme conditions such as unpredictable wind, large swells, kelp, and an unforgiving fleet of boats made racing difficult. Even though I didn't place very high in my fleet, I completed every race (there were 12 races overall) and I still had a great time. Sailing alongside skippers who are more experienced, and more skilled make me think about the decisions i make on the course tactically. This made me realize that I have much to learn for my next competition. I enjoy sailing because of the required tactics and challenges and there are multiple strategies that yield varying results. It is important to pick a strategy that will help you perform at the highest level, but to also be able to guick on your feet as conditions change.

North Americans included Olympic competitors from several countries that traveled to Long Beach from North, Central, and South

America, as well as Europe, mixed with local sailors like myself. I quickly became friendly with a few of the sailors. It was amazing that they gladly shared information on their rigging setups and tactics. Even though we were all competing against each other, we all still love the same thing and that brings us together and makes for a better regatta experience for everyone.

When Blue and Yellow are on the same tack and overlapped, rule 11 requires Blue the windward boat to keep clear of yellow the leeward boat. However, Yellow's actions are limited by rules 16.1 and 17. There was room for Blue to keep clear when Yellow luffed, therefore Yellow did not break 16.1. When Yellow luffed she was sailing a more direct course to the finish line, on a faster point of

sail. Yellow was not entitled to sail above her proper course, but she was entitled to luff to her proper course even though she had established the overlap from clear astern within two boat lengths of Yellow. So Yellow did not break rule 17.

Blue's proper course is not relevant to rule 17. Blue is required to keep clear of

Yellow. When Yellow luffed she gave Blue room to keep clear as required by

16.1. When Yellow had to curtail her luff at position to avoid contact, Blue broke

rule 11. Blue should be disgualified.
