The junior program this year will feature two four-week sessions for most of the classes: June 19 to July 13, and July 17 to August 11. For the learn to sail program we are

He will mainly be focused on the double handed program, but I expect we will see him in other classes as well. Please welcome Carter to the Club. In addition to the regularly scheduled classes, we are offering unique clinics. For example, in May we had a Q Foil Day where juniors could try their hand at the Q Foil boards, as well as knocking around in the C420s. We will repeat this successful program over the summer. On June 3-4, we are offering an ILCA clinic with Rosie Chapman, who is a highly regarded sailing coach, former head of Women Sailing for Yachting New Zealand and a former British sailing team member. Sign ups for this one are going fast. Finally, we will be having a Junior Olympics event prior to the Olympic Classes Regatta to offer juniors the opportunity to try out one of the Olympic classes. Should be fun and educational.







hen the course requires boats to pass between two marks at a gate, a boat complies with rule 28.1 if the string representing her track when drawn taut passes between the marks from the direction of the previous mark (see the definition Sail the Course). She complies with rule 28.1 even if the string also passes one mark of the gate on the non-required side. In this case Dumpster Fire passed the buoy serving as mark 4p of the gate on the non-required side before passing it on the required side.

CONCLUSION

Dumpster Fire sailed the course correctly.

DECISION

1. The protest is dismissed.

to the Isthmus. There are no scheduled activities for this event. Come, relax and hang out with your ABYC Cruiser Friends! Carol Clanton




