I think we're going to have to bring the International French Fry Coalition of Long Beach together and have a fry tasting night. We have the ability to make fresh french fries thanks to some benevolent member but we buy frozen fries. So we'll have to do some tasting of fries, of different salts and different dipping sauces so be on the lookout for that announcement.

I am working on updating our hours of operation for food and bar service. As it stands:

- Wednesday: presently no food(I'm at the 1 yard line, stay tuned), bar service on the patio from 4 to 7
- Thursday: We provide food for the Lido sailors, right now this is about 40-50 ppl. If you're looking to come down to eat, it would be helpful to let Sheila know on Wed so I can prepare additional food. Eventually I'll have the galley open but for now, we just make food for the Lido fan club. We want people to come and enjoy the club, we just want to have enough food for everyone. - Also, Aaron is behind the bar

from 4 to 9. And we just hired Alia to help with the bar as well so we'll be staffed.

- Friday: Happy Hour, bar & kitchen open at 4. Last call for food will be 8:30, this gives the team an hour to properly clean the kitchen, label & store the food and organize anything they need for the next day. Last call at the bar will be 9:30 and we'll close at 10. If we get to a point where you want us to stay open later, we can do that, I just need to adjust the schedules so as to avoid unplanned overtime. Extended hours can result in overtime and or meal penalties and this is an area of focus for me and The Board.
- Saturday: Galley from 8:30 to 4. Right now I do not have Happy Hour available but I am working on that. We will have cocktails, beer, Bloody Mary's etc. available out of the Galley as Ann will be in their mixing her heart out. Aaron and Alia will have Happy Hour on the patio from 3 to 8. We can extend these hours as business grows
- Sunday: Galley from 8:30 to 4, bar service out of the Galley.

Please keep in mind, the more you come to the club, the more I am able to improve & evolve your experience. People riding by in boats, folks walking by our campus, the more they see you engaging with family and friends, they more they'll want to join. That's how cults, I mean clubs work!. Also, this added food service and improved beverage pricing and selection will help up maximize revenue for outside events. Membership to ABYC is exclusive, we need to have a wait list of people wanting to join. I know Michael Oliver is working tirelessly on that and we want to carry our load to make membership a no brainer for anyone interested.

I am working on photos of the staff and name tags. I'm looking for another maintenance person and a lunch cook so if you know anyone, let me know.

I need to reconfigure the closets in the junior room, we need to be able to clean and hang our blue linens. I want to get them professionally dry cleaned twice a year but we should be able to handle washing and storing at the club. So if anyone has any closet/woodworking skills, please let me know.

I am working on the blue cushions by the chess board. The interiors are in bad shape so I expect to have a bid for commercial cushions this week. We want to have those couches available on the patio. A big thanks to Mr & Mrs. Taugher, between him giving the high top chairs a paint job and the Mrs. making table covers, the table tops that Bob Bishop made will last a good 10+ years.

Thanks to Gabe Ferramola for bringing in a college regatta from UCI this weekend. It was brisk, the Galley was popping for Chef Ramon and Melissa and it was a good amount of business for Ann to train Alia. 

ith less than 1 foot separating the two boats, Freedo, the leeward boat, could not luff without immediately making contact with Gift Horse, the windward boat. The definition of keep clear says; "A boat keeps clear of a right-of-way boat (a) if the right-of-way boat can sail her course with no need to take avoiding action

(b) when the boats are overlapped, if the right-of-way boat can also change course in both directions without immediately making contact." If Freedo luffs she would immediately make contact with Gift Horse. Therefore, Gift Horse is not keeping clear at position 1 and continues not to keep clear throughout the incident.

If the protest committee clearly establishes that Gift Horse deliberately held her course to avoid being OCS, then Gift Horse has also broken rule 2 and her penalty shall be a disqualification that is not excludable (DNE).

CONCLUSION

Gift Horse to windward failed to keep clear of Freedo to leeward, and broke RRS 11..

By knowingly breaking rule 11 and not taking the appropriate penalty, Gift Horse failed to compete in compliance with the principles of sportsmanship and fair play. Gift Horse broke RRS 2.

DECISION


Protest upheld. Gift Horse is DNE.


