The 1992 Olympic Medalist Craig Monk (NZL 237) leads a 38 boat fleet at the U.S. Nationals with 3 bullets. He is followed by Eric Lidecis (USA 505) with 6 points. The USAFA veteran and a long-standing leader of the class, Darrel Peck is tied for third place with Anatolii Nosar (UKR 7) with 18 points.



The 1992 Olympic Finn Medalist Craig Monk (NZL

237) continues to lead a 38-boat fleet at the Finn U.S. Nationals followed by Eric Lidecis (USA 505) and Anatolii Nosar (UKR 7) third, followed by Peter Sangmeister (USA-89) in fourth (also Top U23 Sailor) and Mike Dorgan (USA-8) in fifth overall, rounding out the top five. Races were conducted on the south course off of Seal Beach in 7-11 knots with wins on day 2 going to Mike Dorgan (race 4), Eric Lidecis (Race 5 & 6) and Craig Monk (race 7), setting up a show down for the overall win on the final race day, Sunday.

Saturday evening the Finn fleet enjoyed a delicious catered dinner hosted by Gladstones with a US Finn Annual meeting held afterwards. Day 3

The stage was set for final day of the 2022 Finn US National Championships in Long Beach hosted by ABYC. The



morning greeted the 37-Finn sailors with sunny, clear blue skies indicating the Long Beach wind-doctor would be making an appearance blowing early and would increase to 18-20 knots by the start of the first race on Sunday/Race 8. Olympic Medalist and regatta leader Craig Monk (NZL236) handled the windy conditions with ease, winning the first race of the day with Darrel Peck (USA35) finishing in 2nd place and second overall and long time Finn sailor Eric Lidecis (USA 505) in third. For the final race, the wind picked up to 22 knots, w/ gust 24+ and big waves sailing outside the breakwater and to the south, just off Seal Beach, providing the Finn sailors w/ excited huge waves for the downwind surf-fest! in the last and 9th race of the series, overall results seem to be secured with Monk taking the lead from Lidecis on the downwind run, and seemingly for the regatta until Monk caught a wave the wrong way and flipped his Finn= and unfortunately for Monk, had a hard time getting his boat righted and continuing to sail on. Lidecis seized

a hard time getting his boat righted and continuing to sail on. Lidecis seized the opportunity after seeing Monk capsize, sailed conservatively to finish third and coupled w/ sailing a very consistent regatta



BYC hosted the U.S. FINN National Championship May 19~22. The Finners,15 to 72 years of age, were greeted with the best of ABYC's hospitality and professionalism. Vice Commodore Brooke Jolly embraced the regatta over a year ago as we presented the bid to the U.S. FINN Association, Ed Spotskey and Mark Townsend guided the protocols for the National level regatta. Long Beach produced 3 very different days of sailing conditions with sailing areas assigned the morning of by the ABYC Race management team. One of ABYC's newest members, Randy Smith accepted PRO duties with Mark Townsend at his side they were backed up by an amazing group of mark and line set professionals including a very busy rescue

mark's rules swer #91

hen Go Ahead Make My Day reaches the zone, she is the inside overlapped right-of way boat entitled to mark-room under rule 18.2(b). Go Ahead Make My Day must gybe at the mark to sail her proper course, but rule 18.4, Mark-Room Gybing, does not apply as the mark is a gate.

At position 2, when both boats gybe, Hasta La Vista Baby becomes the leeward right-of-way boat. Rule 15, Acquiring Right of Way, does not apply as Hasta La Vista Baby acquired right of way when Go Ahead Make My Day gybed. Hasta La Vista Baby, the outside boat, still owes Go Ahead Make My Day mark-room.

However, mark-room is room to sail to the mark, not room to sail her proper course. When contact occurs Go Ahead Make My Day is no longer sailing within the mark room to which she is entitled and breaks rule 11. Because there is contact causing damage, which could have reasonably been avoid by both boats, they both break rule 14. The fact that the damage was to Hasta La Vista Baby, the right-of-way boat, is inconsequential when deciding if a boat broke rule 14 or can be exonerated under rule 43.1(c).

CONCLUSION

Go Ahead Make My Day to windward failed to keep clear of Hasta La Vista Baby to leeward, and broke RRS 11.

Go Ahead Make My Day did not avoid contact when it was reasonably possible, and broke RRS 14.

Hasta La Vista Baby the right-of-way boat did not act to avoid contact with Go Ahead Make My Day when it was reasonably possible. Hasta La Vista Baby broke RRS 14.

Hasta La Vista Baby the right-of-way boat did not act to avoid contact when it became clear that Go Ahead Make My Day was not keeping clear. Hasta La Vista Baby broke RRS 14.






