olunteer Sailing Instructors Needed to Teach Adult Sailing

Start your new year off right by attending the second, annual boot camp for ABYC members who want to teach adult sailing. Join fellow ABYC members who graduated from this year's boot camp and are sharing their passion for sailing by teaching others how to sail in a Tempest.

The ABYC boot camp will show you how to teach a complete novice how to sail using the acclaimed American Sailing Association program called ASA-101 Basic Keelboat Sailing. Over four Saturdays, you will provide a total non-sailor with the skills they need to confidently sail a small keelboat in moderate breezes.

You will learn the teaching skills developed by ASA and have the option of becoming an ASA-certified instructor. After completing the ten-hour boot camp, your minimum commitment will be to teach one four-Saturday session each year.

If this sounds attractive to you, contact Dominic at dommeo@usitalongbeach.org. He will answer any questions you may have and provide more details on the training you will need to teach ASA-101.

Our training program for volunteer instructors will take place over three Saturdays: January 14 and 21 and February 4. Training on January 14 and 21 is onshore. The training on February 4 is on the water in a Tempest. The total time commitment is about 10 hours. We are particularly interested in finding volunteers who can teach during July and August.



hirty seconds before the start, Rhyme or Reason, close-hauled on starboard tack, was sailing towards the race committee signal vessel. Yabba Dabba Doo! and Soup to Nuts were overlapped, both on a reach on starboard tack sailing towards the starting line. Yabba Dabba Doo!, to windward of Soup to Nuts, bore away to pass astern of Rhyme or Reason. Soup to Nuts bore away to avoid contact with Yabba Dabba Doo! No contact occurred. Soup to Nuts protested Yabba Dabba Doo! under rule 11, stating that rule 18 and rule 19 don't apply when boats are approaching to start.

Neither boat took a penalty. How should the protest committee rule? See if you can figure out the relevant facts, conclusions, and decision.

ALLOWEEN CHARITY REGATTA DONATIONS AND THANK YOUS

Alamitos Bay Yacht Club held our 37th Annual Halloween Charity Regatta to benefit The Children's Clinic Family Health on October 29, with a good turn out with 53 entries. The event raised nearly \$6000 for the Long Beach non-profit system of 11 medical clinics through the Silent Auction, donations, and in-kind gifts.

Winners of the Largest Fleet Daniel Ting Perpetual Trophy, donated by the late Norma and Dan Clapp, were Mark Ryan and Loma Bad, representing the Lido 14's 15 entries. Lido 14 Fleet 6 held its Championship in conjunction with the Halloween Regatta. All racing results are on the ABYC website.

For the Silent Auction, active racing fleets at ABYC were asked to each bring in one basket. We were surprised and delighted that they responded with as many as 5 baskets! The Silent Auction generated an estimated total of \$3,200. The OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTION Perpetual Trophy went to the Viper Fleet and the Lido 14 Fleet which really came up with beautiful and highly desirable Silent Auction baskets that produced great bidding competitions.

The CREW CHALLENGE Perpetual Trophy was won by "PCH", Todd and Cathy Black Smith from ABYC with a total crew donation of \$500. Other participants included "Swoosh 4" and "Lickety Split" with a total of an additional \$350 in donations. So this year's Crew Challenge generated \$850—more than 3 times last year's amount.

Direct monetary donations totaled \$1200. Thank you, donors! ection C rules do not apply at a starting mark surrounded by navigable water or at its anchor line from the time boats are approaching them to start until they have passed them. However, rule 19 still applies at other obstructions. Rhyme or Reason was an obstruction to Yabba Dabba Doo! Because Soup to Nuts chose to pass Rhyme or Reason to leeward, rule 19.2(b) required Soup to Nuts to give Yabba Dabba Doo! room to also pass to leeward between Rhyme or Reason and Soup to Nuts. Yabba Dabba Doo! broke rule 11 when she changed course to leeward and caused Soup to Nuts to immediately change course to avoid her. However, since Yabba Dabba Doo! was sailing within the room to which she was entitled under rule 19.2(b) to pass the obstruction, she was exonerated by rule 43.1(b) at the time of the incident.

CONCLUSIONS

- 1. Yabba Dabba Doo! to windward failed to keep clear of Soup to Nuts to leeward, and broke RRS 11.
- 2. Since Yabba Dabba Doo! broke RRS 11 while she was sailing within the room to which she was entitled, she is exonerated under RRS 43.1(b) for this breach.

DECISION

1. The protest is dismissed.

alifornia Dreamin' -Meet Long Beach's Melges 15 fleet

The Melges 15 is continuing its record growth across the U.S. with Alamitos Bay Yacht Club among the newest fleets popping up on the West Coast.

Melges tuned in with Nick Kofski from Long Beach to get the lowdown on the budding Melges 15 scene out West. Kofski, a former Viper and Vanguard sailor, took delivery of his new Melges 15 this Fall.

"Alamitos Bay Yacht Club is one of the main venues for dinghy sailing in the Los Angeles area with solid fleets among the Lasers, Viper 640s, Lidos, and Sabots. The fleets are made up of all types from world champions and Olympians to the regular weekend cruiser types."

Originally from Chicago, Kofski knew a few friends who had purchased Melges 15s and were enjoying the Winter Series. "Speaking with my friends, the M15 looked like a fun fleet that was affordable to get into and might fill a void at our club as well. So we got a few guys together and lined up an order."



The void Kofski alluded to was the declining participation in a few of the one-design fleets at his club. "The big numbers at the Winter Series and across the country were especially encouraging for us as we were looking to start a new fleet. We had a few club members moving away from the once-dominant classes and looking for a new design that would tick all the boxes."

"Long Beach has perfect conditions for the M15 with the normal breeze around 12-16 knots and small sea state on most summer days. It's a fairly simple boat with a manageable kite that is easy for crews to deal with. It also has great speed for the size and cost of the boat - it's sorta hard to beat."

A reflection of the Melges 15 Class nationwide, the ABYC owners come from a variety of backgrounds, ages, and levels of experience. "Our owners run the gamut ranging from their 30s to their 60s, with a few families

already sailing with their kids that are in the junior fleet. There are a few couples and friends sharing boats too."

From holiday regattas to weeknight racing and premiere annual events run out of ABYC, there's no shortage of activity for the Melges 15 fleet to engage with. A few short weeks after receiving their boats, the fleet was racing in the Turkey Day Regatta. "Six of us are brand new owners and the other traveled from nearby," said Kofski. "We saw winds from 5-24kts, so it was great for all of us newbies. We had a blast with lots of lead changes and very close racing for all."

In addition to local events, Kofski hopes to do some traveling on the East Coast and is heading to the Winter Series

next month. "We're stoked to see 70 boats on the line," added Kofski.

Now glasses are empty, crumbs litter the table, Gabe still has to share


one last fable

Jack did exclaim as he drove out of sight "Cheers, cheers to all, and to all a good night!"


