manager's rner



hat a windy month we've enjoyed during the month of February. 30-40+ knots here at the club, reminds me of those good ol' tornado days of Louisiana.

We've got a busy March before with something going on

every weekend. The Manning kicks things off as we inch closer to Opening Day and it's great to see the usual suspects getting onto the water along with all of the participants in the sailing classes we've got going on.

I've had members inquire about costs and wanted to share a few things that I hope are informative:

- Covid caught everyone by surprise and coming out of Covid, our ability to be competitive and attractive as an employer became a focus and an area of opportunity. With just our core staff as an example, we're spending over \$10-\$15 more per hour, roughly \$20-30k more a year for the same labor hours. This doesn't include the areas that we've expanded on the F & B team, just office, maintenance and sailing.
- We've all felt the pinch at the pump for gas, well, our vendors have increased their rates and some have added fuel surcharges on top of price increases for deliveries.
- Raise your hand if you haven't paid \$100 for a case of eggs because I have! 6 months ago, eggs were \$60 a case and have come down slightly from a high of \$110 a case
- Before my arrival, we were using Peninsula Supply who purchased products for us from Restaurant Depot. Now we are using Sysco for most proteins and using Costco to get some items in smaller sizes versus ordering larger cases from Sysco. Sysco has "1st pick" produce; Restaurant Depot does not. Our burger is a fresh Certified Angus Beef blend aged 28 days from Newport Meat. What you were getting from Restaurant Depot and Smart & Final is a frozen patty with no aging and made with fillers.

 - o Marie Callendar's + fries \$12 + tip
 - Shake Shack burger \$9.59 + fries \$3.99 + drink \$3.99
 - Five Guys burger + fries & drink \$22 + tip
 - o Crooked Duck \$15.50
 - Walt's Wharf Seal Beach \$19
 - Vibes Cafe house burger \$16 + tip
 - Kincaid's burger \$17 + tip
 - o Boathouse burger \$22 + tip

 Wally's Santa Monica \$35 + tip (I can neither confirm nor deny that Sheila frequents Wally's)

Not to brag, but I'm pretty sure our meat quality will stand up to everybody on this list. We're working to give you a quality food experience and with that, things cost a little more than what you've paid in the past. The \$10-\$12 burger here at ABYC would cost you upwards of \$15-\$18 more anywhere else. I hope you can taste the difference in the food and can appreciate the team trying to deliver little things to make your experience a little better.

ABYC is located at a better spot than LBYC and Newport Beach YC combined, and no amount of investment will change that. We're trying to put something on the plate that is representative of that, and hopefully, that's something we can all agree on, be proud of plus appreciate the blessings of family, friends and respite that we can only get here.

A few housekeeping reminders and updates:

- New towel dispensers have been ordered, thank you Commodore Staff Merle Asper
- Please remember we need to keep the gate secured at all times. If you're having an event, you'll need to provide someone responsible to man the pedestrian gate because we cannot leave it open and unattended. If you don't have someone, we have to get a security guard at \$42 an hour with a 6 hour minimum.
- With summer concerts coming soon, we hope to continue to have members enjoying music from the 2nd deck but want to remind you that the gate must be closed and you must escort your Guests on property
- Vice Commodore Gabe Ferramola needs your help! Spring Spruce Up is right around the corner, join the fun and enjoy a day of pitching in fixing up the club.
- We're replacing the water sprayers on the hoses, hoses and reels are also on the list.

ime for an update on the adult and junior sailing programs!

As previously reported, we have two distinct adult learn to sail programs. The ASA certification program (winter session) starts the first week of March. This is the program held in Tempests and run by

Dominic Meo and Henk Baar with ABYC members as instructors.

We also have a somewhat less intensive adult learn to sail sailing program in sabots, the first session of which occurred the last weekend in February. A dozen students registered. A blustery Saturday class had much time on the hard, no time on the water due to the weather. The fleet ventured into the bay on Sunday— a relatively calm day (see photo). The next session is in April. Thanks to Stephen Long, Kathy Weishampel, Bruce and Pam Gallagher, Tom Newton, Christina Van Dyke, Jack Hanson and Ainsley O'Brien, among others, for organizing and teaching that program.

The Spring junior sailing program started in early February for the double-handed skills class (FJs), high school sailing (FJs), ILCA skills and race team and Optis. The beginning and intermediate classes start up in early April. So far we have over fifty sailors signed up for the Spring junior programs, with strong participation especially in the high school and ILCA programs. One challenge is that much of our Opti Champ fleet was lured away by BalboaYacht Club, so there is a rebuilding effort there. There are still some open slots in the beginning and intermediate courses so if you know any young sailor-to-be, get them signed up.

Registration for the summer junior program is now open, with the same mix of courses. The first session starts June 19. This summer we will look to add training in our new 420s, as well as in keelboats and match racing (dependent on acquiring J22s—see more below). We have expanded the beginning and intermediate course capacity— so we would really appreciate all efforts to get more young potential sailors in the program.

On the personnel front, we were successful in hiring Carter Brock as our new head coach. He currently is the assistant varsity sailing coach at MIT, and will join us after the conclusion of the college sailing season. He will be focused on coaching the double handed programs here at ABYC. This will include a new program using the 420s.

Equipment wise, we are looking to sell up to four of our more mature FJs. Stephen already has a potential buyer lined up. Two new FJs were acquired late last year and are being introduced to our line up. As previously reported, we also own or charter a fleet of nine excellent ILCAs, now fully equipped for the skills and race team classes. In the summer, we will roll out a 420 class. We now have two 420s and hope to acquire a third for that program.

We will be adding keelboat training and a match race program. After much discussion (including valuable input from Steve Flam who has agreed to teach the match race program), we are focused on acquiring two J22s for those programs. The J22 is used in match racing at clubs around the country. We are closing in on the acquisition of our first J22 (check to be issued this week?) with funding provided by the ABSF— most of those proceeds came from an insurance settlement on the club Tempest that unfortunately went on the rocks last year. So some good news following what had been an unhappy event.

fleet captain's



group of experienced and new faces signed up and showed up on February 18th to learn how to safely drive our fleet of whalers, recommended techniques for setting, anchoring, moving and retrieving race marks.

Steve Kuritz, along with

Gordon Palmer and Mike Baumann were the course instructors who started out with a whiteboard classroom presentation of race course set-up, use of signal flags, sound signals, adjusting the race course for wind and weather conditions, safe techniques around capsized boats, assisting sailors in the water and more. We were also reminded that the Racing Rules of Sailing now allow a sailor to accept assistance from a safety/rescue boat and continue racing.

Once out of the classroom, we gathered anchors, lines, chain, life jackets, tetrahedron race marks and more to load on our fleet of four whalers. Once loaded up and assigned to boats, we moved into the Bay were each boat and crew practiced rigging, setting, moving, and recovering race marks.

Back at the dock we were shown how to access and use the QR Codes attached to the key of each whaler. Accessing the QR code on a mobile phone allows a boat operator to note any items or systems that need attention at the end of the day. See more explanation in this report.

The session was a worthwhile exercise for us and worth repeating in the future.

A session to learn how to drive our Race Committee boat *Patience* had to be postponed; however, this training will be rescheduled.

Using the Fleet Check-Out Form How to scan a QR code with the Camera app.

1. Locate the QR code on the boat's key ring.

- 2. Open the Camera app on your phone.
- 3. Hold your device so that the QR code appears in the viewfinder in the Camera app. Your device will recognize the QR code and show a notification.
- 4. Tap the notification to open the link associated with the QR code. That will open the form.

Filling out the Form

- 1. Select your boat.
- 2. Enter your name. We already have an *Ahab*, so use your real name, please.
- 3. Do everything on the Close Checklist, check them off when complete. If you miss something do not sweat it, just let us know by not checking the box.
- 4. Indicate how much fuel is left.
- Tell us anything that we need to know about your experience on the boat that day. Especially things that need to be repaired.
- 6. Go to the Galley and get a snack.

After the recent rain, be sure to check your boat covers are intact and your boat is not full of water. You might check your trailer tires are inflated as well.

New Fuel Tanks for Whalers

The fuel tanks on our fleet of whalers were leaking and beginning to show their age. We found what appears to be a sturdy replacement. **Grant Hill** has numbered the new tanks, so we will know the difference between the old tanks and the replacements. Look for the new tanks on the whalers.

Grant has now stenciled the containers with the information seen in this photo. You can also see our Bay Race Marks undergoing repair and paint by **Martyn Bookwalter**.




East Yard Containers. Photo by Grant Hill

earning to be a sailing mom
My daughter Anielka has been sailing regattas
with her partner Matilde since July of last year,
so about 7 months. Their first regatta together was a travel
regatta; CFJ Nationals down in Mission Bay. They placed
40/44, which we all felt was pretty good for their first
regatta. Since July they have done a Shadden (or two?)
and raced in some of the High School sailing regattas
(Anteater, Rose Bowl). This last weekend we went up to
the Bay Area to sail the Golden Bear Regatta. It was our
second travel regatta as fairly new sailing parents, and it
was something else.

The forecast in San Francisco was for highs in the low 40's with high winds and rain. We did a pretty decent job of packing and preparing for sailing in such unusual conditions. Thanks to Coach Stephen for convincing the girls that they should wear wool socks under their booties! I only wish they'd taken his tip of wearing dish gloves on top of their sailing gloves, too! I think Stephen is going to write a special Sou'Wester article about what to wear in cold weather sailing, so I won't go into that too deeply. All I'll say is that we were very happy with fleece, non-cotton long underwear, and wool layers under spray pants and jacket.

The first day there was no wind until late in the day. After waiting around for what seemed like hours, they finally managed to get a couple races in before 5.

The second day the weather was foul. It rained almost the entire day. On the dock in the howling wind and rain I overheard one sailor say to another, "Is it normally like this in Northern California?" His companion retorted, "It's not normally like this anywhere in California!" As we stood on the splintered dock of the Treasure Island Sailing Center, spiky rain punching us in the face while the wind rattled the jib sheets in an unholy racket, I had to agree. It felt more like Boston than the Bay Area.

My sailing instructor at OCC used to say, "Sailing is so relaxing, until it's not." The second day on the water was exactly that; the sailors were out on the water waiting for wind, dancing in their boats, or hooking up in impromptu

flotillas as they told each other jokes and stories. Then suddenly the wind went from 0 to 60 (or 2 to 20, to be exact). FJs were speeding through the waves, hyper powered by the wind. Many boats were overwhelmed by the gusts. At one point, as all the boats were coming in, both gold and silver fleet kids were screaming at each other trying to dock, while at least 3 boats were capsized at the same time. It was mayhem.

Sailing is a marvelous sport. Watching the kids sail this weekend I felt so much admiration for their persistence, their grit, and their courage. And it wasn't just the racing; watching them navigate the treacherous gusts and "puffs" as they sailed around for what felt like hours in the freezing rain waiting for the course to be set, watching them throw themselves back out into the waves for their second race of the day (even though they'd just been fished out from their first race) or even watching them haul their boats out of the roiling sea up the rickety ramp in the rain was awe inspiring. I feel very lucky to be a sailing mom and to get to see this side of their experience up close.

We sailed with a great group of kids from Los Al/Sato and St John Bosco. The parents all pulled together and helped make the trip fun and as comfortable as possible for kids and parents alike. Even though Bosco has a new group of sailors, they did great out on the water (Jack and Tanner got a first in one of their races), and their parents did a wonderful job of including all the kids and parents in the team dinner etc. I definitely felt like I learned something about how to handle myself as a regatta parent. For example, the Bosco parents ordered an extra pizza at lunch on the rainy cold day for the race committee!

I should note that the girls achieved their goal of being "solidly mid-fleet" in this race, coming in 17/31. This is a big improvement from nationals only 7 months ago! But even if they had come in last, we still would have learned a lot this weekend. I'm super proud of them for what they did this weekend, and feel very lucky to be a sailing mom.



pportunity Knocks and Hyper are maneuvering just before the starting signal. Opportunity Knocks, to windwardof the starting line, bears away to sail to the pre-start side of the line. Hyper passes astern of the race committees ignal vessel and starts to luff to a close-hauled course to start. At position 2 Hyper is unable to luff to a close-hauled course without risk of contact with Opportunity Knocks. Opportunity Knocks crosses to the pre-start side of the starting line and luffs to start about 1 ft to windward of Hyper. Hyper hails protest just before the starting signal. There is no contact and neither boat takes a penalty.

Hyper says was unable to luff to a close-hauled course to start for fear of hitting Opportunity Knocks who was sailing directly towards her.

Opportunity Knocks argues that Hyper was not allowed to alter course by rule 16 and there was room for her to come in to windward. Because there was no contact, she kept clear.

How should the protest committee rule? See if you can figure out the relevant facts, conclusions, and decision.

ule 11 required Opportunity Knocks to 'keep clear' of Hyper. 'Keep clear' means something more than 'avoid contact'; otherwise, the rule would contain those or similar words. Therefore, the fact that the boats did not collide does not necessarily establish that Opportunity Knocks kept clear. The definition Keep Clear in combination with the facts determines whether or not Opportunity Knocks complied with the rule. In this case, the key question raised by the definition is whether Hyper was able to 'sail her course with no need to take avoiding action'.

The following considerations lead to the conclusions that Opportunity Knocks failed to keep clear of Hyper and therefore broke rule 11: 1) The boats were on collision courses, which meant that at least one of them would have to change course. 2) Hyper had a reasonable apprehension of collision if she were to sail her course, which was to luff to a close-hauled course. 3) At position 3 Hyper cannot change course without immediately contacting Opportunity Knocks.

CONCLUSIONS

1. Opportunity Knocks to windward failed to keep clear of Hyper to leeward, and broke RRS 11.

DECISION

1. Opportunity Knocks is DSQ in the race.




