# A Privateer New Year's Then and Now

The only constant in the universe, so they say, is change.

New Year's Eve 1965 was the first time I ever attended a New Year's party at Privateer Yacht Club. My children's mother and I had moved back to Chattanooga just a year earlier with our 5 small children, and it was our first big New Year's party. In fact, it might have been our first ever New Year' party.

### What a revelation!

Turns out, back then, the Privateer Yacht Club New Year's Party was the hottest ticket in town!

There were perhaps 75 to 100 people, maybe more, crowded into the old club house. The club was much smaller then and there were many non-members. Dean Hearn was playing dance tunes on a record player (you young folks, ask your parents). Couples were dancing. Others chatting around the bar with drinks in their hands. It was a convivial crowd. And loud!

As midnight approached Dean switched to a radio broadcast from New York City so everyone could listen to the count-down to 1966. At the stroke of midnight. everyone joined in singing Auld Ang Syne.

Dan and Joan Williams circulated through the crowd pouring everyone a splash of champaign, Dan kissing all the ladies, and Joan kissing all the guys, a custom they had started 10 years previously at the New Year's party prior to their wedding.

Their rounds completed, a large group of revelers surrounded Dan on the club house porch and raucously sang to the melody of "Taps." "Ta-ta-TAH, ta-ta-TAH; Ta-ta-Tah, ta-ta-Tah, Ta-ta-Taah. Ta-TA-TAH, TAH-Ta-ta. Ta-ta-taaah! Following which Dan threw an empty champaign bottle out into the lake.

This "ceremony (if such could be dignified by the term)," continued unbroken, but times change and over the years the party became smaller and smaller. There were years when there was no party at all, or perhaps a last-minute event put together by one fleet or another. In some years recently as few as 4 or 5 showed up, but those champaign bottles kept being thrown into the lake year upon year until Dan's passing over two years ago.

As the first New Year's following Dan's death approached, Joan asked me to carry on the "tradition," and I did. Their son Chris was here to do the honors last year. But this year found me alone as 2021 came to a close. A recent health issue and the contin-

uing Covid crisis kept me from attending a family wedding in Florida, so there I sat at home, reading on New Year's Eve.

Shortly after 11, I closed my book and went to the refrigerator looking for a 7-ounce bottle of California sparkling wine I thought was in there somewhere. Finding it way in the back, I decided on the spur of the moment that I would take it up to Privateer and see if anyone was there.

They were not.

The parking lot and club house were as black as the inside of your hat. A Stygian darkness with dense fog all around muffling what sounds there were.

Taking my small bottle of "champaign" and a clear plastic cup, I pulled up a chair on the porch, zipped my jacket up tight, and listened to fireworks I couldn't see going off all around me in the fog.

I sipped my "champaign."

At midnight I emptied the cup, stood up at the railing, and as I had done annually for over half a century I sang," Ta-ta-TAH....." And then I threw the empty bottle out into the fog.


I heard it splash as it joined it's 65 or so big brothers reposing there on the bottom of Lake Chickamauga.

Now, it may have just been the fog or perhaps the "champaign." But I had to force myself to go home.

# **PYC RACING**

### FROSTBITE 2021-22

Format: Time-on-distance Pursuit

### Courses:

- Selected from 15 pre-defined courses using navigation markers
- Posted on PYC bulletin board on race day at 13:00, with starting times for each boat's PYC PHRF rating (posted on bulletin board)
- Scratch boat will start at 14:00

### **Rules:**

- Pursuant to 2021-24 RRS and as modified for this series
- Race will be abandoned if no boat finishes within 2 hours after scratch boat's starting time

### Start and Finish:

- Line will be between PYC nun and green secondary channel mark approximately 100 yards south of PYC nun
- Each boat should remain in vicinity of finish line to note/record finish order of boat after their finish; order of finishes will be posted on sheet on clubhouse bar
- Be aware of shoal area SSE of green secondary channel marker

**Times:** Official time is the wall clock on the south wall of the clubhouse; this clock is synchronized to Internet time

**In Lieu of Fee:** Bring food to share and your own drink, as designated on the PYC calendar (and below); pizza will be provided by PYC at the last race on March 6, 2022; bring your own drink

**Swag:** 2021 Frostbite long-sleeve shirts with PYC logo will be offered for sale this year

- Rob recapped the 2021 year...

  - Lots of changes since 1972 when Rob first became a member and finding the club in the best position ever
  - o PSEF...sail camp, youth sailing/racing, adult learn to sail
  - Kitchen upgrades underway
  - Maximum membership for both family and associates
  - Membership enthusiasm...people who want to get involved
- Thanks to all previous Boards for their work and thanks to the 2021
   Board for continuing the work to allow the Club to thrive even during a year of covid.

#### Martin Gregory, Secretary:

- Martin verified that a quorum of the membership was present
- Martin stated that the minutes had been reviewed by the Board and corrections had been made.

- 41 signs/labels have been ordered for dry slip identification.
- GFI outlets to be installed on all wet slips
- Thanks to Dave, Tom, Eddie for their help on the Junior Dock

### Frank Hughes, Rear Commodore – Buildings and Grounds:

- A number of projects were completed during the year
  - "Rock Party" to add rip-rap to the shoreline
  - Club grounds clean up party to remove brush and debris
  - Kitchen upgrades in progress
  - Tree removal along the boat ramp
  - Erosion control in the parking lots
- Frank recognized as Guy Campbell as PYC "Hard Worker" for all he does around the club throughout the year.

#### Tim Chambers - Director Club Boats:

- All five club boat motors were serviced twice during the year.
- Prop guards were added to all outboard motors
- 12 volt outlets were installed on all motor boats
- Two inflatables developed leaks and were repaired.
- The Whaler had electrical problems which were resolved
- The skiff sank (and was recovered)
- Pontoon boat is undergoing a major overhaul.
  - The rotten front deck was replaced
  - Hulls were drained and leaks welded shut and cleat mounts were welded to the frame
  - New decking is being prepared and will be installed soon
  - Mooring cleat will be added to facilitate docking/tying
  - Dock Boxes are being replaced and new driver and assistant seats are being installed.
  - o Tim thanked all who have helped with the pontoon boat overhaul.

### Tina Campbell - Social Director:

- Had socials and/or regattas nearly every month in 2021
- Struggled a little with Covid restrictions...had a number of "open air" events
- Tina thanked the Associate Members for the best ever attended July 4<sup>th</sup> social

- The "traditional" format seems to be preferred with keel boats racing Wednesday and Saturday and dinghies racing Sunday.
- For a small club, had lot of boats on the water racing, even with Covid restrictions
