An Enduring DESIG

WE FREQUENTLY HEAR ABOUT THE BEAUTY OF THE ALERION EXPRESS 28, PERHAPS AD NAUSEUM. BUT BRACE YOURSELVES - I'M ABOUT TO DO IT AGAIN! BEAR WITH ME FOR A LITTLE HISTORY OF THE AE28.

Nathanael G. Herreshoff (1848-1938) designed several America's Cup Defenders, including (name, year) Vigilant 1893, Defender 1895, Columbia 1899 and 1901, Reliance 1903, Resolute 1920 and as builder in partnership with his blind brother John, Enterprise 1930 and Rainbow 1934. An impressive winning streak by "the Wizard of Bristol", Nat Herreshoff.

In 1913, Herreshoff launched his personal day-sailor sloop "Alerion III". His notes record his actions on Saturday October 19, 1912 as "Began work in laying down #718, knockabout for self, Alerion III". Herreschoff sailed the 26' Alerion III in the waters off Bermuda until 1929 when she was sold.

Herreshoff stated he "gave up sailing...at eighty-two, it was becoming a dangerous recreation with increasing awkwardness in all faculties". Yet the original Alerion III lives on to this day; she is currently owned by the Mystic Seaport Museum in Mystic, CT.

Inspired by Herreshoff's genius, Carl Schumacher (1949-2002) designed the Alerion Express 28, along with some 50 other boats between 1976 and his unexpected death at age 53. The AE28 is Schumacher's most successful design, with 471 boats built to date.

The first seven Alerion Express 28 or AE28, were built in 1990 by Holby Marine, at that time located on the historic Herreshoff Complex in Bristol, RI. Holby Marine had also built other successful racing sailboats with designers such as Frers and Tripp. Subsequent AE28s were built by Tillotson Pearson Inc. of Pearson Boats fame and later by US Watercraft and their subsidiary Waterline Systems, which also builds



J-Boats. Peter Johnstone (yes, of the J-Boat family) purchased the molds in 2017 and built just one boat, #471. Finally, Peter Eastman from Howard Boats in Barnstable, MA bought the company and its assets in 2020 – and the brand lives on.

Demand is high for the 471 boats that were produced, with only one used boat listed for sale on the day I wrote this. No one knows how many more AE28s will be built, but one thing is for sure: she remains the prettiest girl at the dance!

TYC members turned out in force for winter J/70 racing in Florida. Narwhal, Measure Twice and Escape all made the trek south and enjoyed competition against each other and 60 other boats. 14 year old skipper Merritt Sellers with a crew that included her sisters took home a second place trophy in the Corinthian Division at the St. Pete Helly Hansen Regatta.

Starting in June, the J/70 Fleet will be back on Little Traverse Bay for a season of tight, family friendly one design racing. Long time fleet crew member Owen Beckley has joined the fleet as an owner purchasing Pronto and renaming it Stormy Weather. Ugotta Regatta will once again be a highlight of the season with 20 boats already registered. Our fleet and great sailing conditions make Little Traverse Bay a marquee destination for J/70s from across the Great Lakes.



HISTORY Connects Us

The first Harbor Springs Regatta was held in 1891 with a historical gap until the 1895 event, billed as "The Greatest Water Sports Event Ever Staged In Northern Michigan" and drawing crowds estimated to be between 5 to 7 thousand spectators (There is NO mention of any parking issues). A ribbon from the event is available for viewing at the local Historical Society. The Cursing event was comprised of Mackinaws and other open-type sloops. It was won by 'White Cloud' sailing under Harbor Point colors of Black and Orange and owned by the Chapin family of Harbor Point. Mr. John S. Hair, of Harbor Point, was Commodore.

This season opens with a hull count. There were 26 hulls as there was originally no #13. However, hull #18 was renumbered to #13 after its initial rescue. There are currently 18 hulls available to race with 13 hulls probable for the 2022 season. There are 5 hulls (#1, 2, 7, 19, and 20) that are not LTYC members, 2 hulls (#15 and 16) are MIA and 1 hull (#14) available for restoration, at the Irish Boat Shop.

Now is the time to drag out your check list and begin the annual process of "where did I put that when the boat was pulled," before this season's launch.

HISTORICALLY HAD A NUMBER OF

MEMBERS RESIGN ANNUALLY. AS A SEASONAL CLUB, TO SOME EXTENT THIS IS TO BE EXPECTED; IN MOST CASES IT IS A RESULT OF PEOPLE MOVING AWAY FROM THE AREA, OR OPTING TO SPEND SUMMERS ELSEWHERE. MORE RECENTLY, WHILE NEW MEMBER INTEREST HAS REMAINED STRONG, THE NUMBER OF PEOPLE RESIGNING HAS STEADILY DECREASED. THE NET RESULT OF THIS IS THAT MEMBERSHIP HAS GROWN.

Besides the general interest and membership satisfaction, we have noticed other good news on the membership front. Membership has historically been about equally split from three general areas: local full-time residents, Michigan residents that spend time here in the summer, and residents from around the country that spend time here in the summer. And membership historically has been slightly, what I might call "age-challenged." In recent years, we have been pleased to see that new members on average have been younger, with more young families, and a trend towards a slightly higher percentage of applicants that are fulltime residents. More applicants (or their children) tend to sail with, or grew up sailing with, Little Traverse Sailors, and on average the newer members tend to use the club more. These are all good trends, and reinforce the idea that our membership and club is strong, and well positioned for the future.
