Team Racing

It has come to my attention that there are some club members who are interested in starting a team racing group. It has been suggested that we have several "events" where some of us might get together and have some good races and clinics on how team racing is done. This would hopefully increase interest in this fantastic aspect of the sport (really a sport unto itself almost). These clinics/race days would most likely fall on holidays during the summer when other club members would be around to cheer us on, gain interest, or laugh at us.

A brief introduction to team racing:

Team Racing is quite similar in tactical maneuvering to match racing, but rather than one on one the teams are 3 vs.3. Typically, this type of race is conducted in small dinghies. Official matches are sailed in all the same onedesign boat, but for our purposes it would be acceptable to mix and match a bit as long as the teams are even. Rather than being strictly about speed, team racing is also about manipulation. This may be a good place to introduce some terminology that my coach beat into us, the difference between strategy and tactics. While fleet racing is predominantly a strategic sport, meaning you plan your overall strategy at the beginning and modify it as time goes on (i.e. I'm going to start on the pin, on port, and go to the right -- so long as there aren't any big shifts), team racing is largely tactical. Rather than picking a strategy at the start we instead maneuver to maintain a tactical advantage over our opponents at all times, regardless of our strategic position. For example, if we are going slowly on the bad side of the course on the wrong tack lets make sure that our opponent is in the exact same position, except BEHIND us. As long as this is the case, we win. But wait!! We forgot about the other two boats on our team!! It is not just where we finish relative to our opponent that matters, but also where our team finishes relative to their opponents as well as ours. We can't just whip everybody and come in first and expect to win. There are certain winning combinations for a team. A team wins in general if the sum of its individual places is less than or equal to 10. The winning combinations are listed below:

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1,2,3 (naturally since the other team finishes 4,5,6)
1,2,4=7
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1,2,5 = 8

1,2,6 = 9 (as you can see a 1,2 is a winner)

1.3.4 = 8

1,3,5 = 9

1,3,6 = 10 (also 1,3 is a winner)

1,4,5 = 10

2,3,4 = 9

2.3.5 = 10

(Notice that 1,5,6 is not in the list, so having a 1st place doesn't guarantee winning.)

So in the end the goal in team racing is to keep the fleet as tightly packed as possible while maneuvering your team into a tactically advantageous position so that when the time is right, when you get close to the finish line, you can hold the other team back while your team wins. This is why team racing is so great, you have a LOT of interaction with your team and the other team and the rules (and how to manipulate them and your opponents) become really important.

So I can throw down a lot of names, but that doesn't mean anything... its all about your TEAM!!!

Hope to hear from you and hope a lot of you will really enjoy team racing... If I could, it would be the only type of racing I did.


