Racing News

Well, the 2008 Season is off to a great start! As of this writing we've sailed all seven races scheduled compared to last year when we only completed three. Thirty skippers have been out, eleven of them Laser sailors. Scott Meyer, fresh off the frostbiting season in Westport, currently leads the fleet in the Zephyr Series with three bullets in four races where he went head to head with perennial fleet champion Allan Miller. Scott jumped to a Thistle in the first race of the Manning on Wednesday night and managed a close second to the powerful three generation team of Dave, John, and Peter Hudson. Commodore James Nicol thumped Georgetown-bound son David in all three of their races so far. The trick according to James is keeping the pointy end of the sail pointing up. Both Allan and David are knocking the rust off their games so I'm not giving odds that these trends will continue.

Lucy Fahy and Lois Haignere celebrated Mothers' Day with first and second places respectively. Lucy and JT somehow managed this with a pair of three-year olds, Aidan and Allison, aboard their Thistle. Mother's Day was not without controversy however. The Race Committee was properly protested for improperly shortening course in the second race. The Race Lieutenant cleverly deflected attention from his ignorance of the rule by awarding multiple first place finishes.

The Wednesday Night Manning series got off to a good start too with twelve finishers. The race was noteworthy for winds up to 20/mph and a few capsizes. The Hudsons struggled with their chute on the first reach but got back in the race and went on to win when the shorthanded team of JT and Lucy hit the leeward mark on the first lap and had to re-round. Scot sailors Matthew Sweeney and Glenn Miner were late for the start but came out for fun anyway. Glenn set a club speed record for single-handing under spinnaker before he "augered in" as Bernie Zabek put it. Rescuing a swamped Scot isn't easy but Allan Miller and Bernie were nearby to help Glenn get the pointy end back up.

Now a couple of thank-you's are due. First to Gene Auciello for hosting the Race Program Meeting and

organizing a fascinating tour of the state-of-the-art National Weather Service office in Albany where he is the Forecaster-in-Charge. The place looks like Mission Control. Suffice it to say I will not be inviting the group for a tour of my workplace anytime soon. We had great presentations from Gene and Senior Forecaster Brian Montgomery. The focus will be on starting with plenty of on-the-water practice. We're targeting the novice/beginner racer crowd but the more the merrier. Lake Math

Assuming Saratoga Lake has an area of 6 square miles (which is equivalent to 167270400 sq ft (ft^2), or 24086937600 sq in (in^2)); and assuming that 1,000,000 gallons of water were to be drawn off each day (there are 231 cu in/gal, so 231,000,000 cu in (in^3) would be taken), doing the math:

231,000,000 in³ / 24086937600 in² = 0.00959026 in In a day that one million gallons of water was taken, the lake level would drop less than 1/100 of an inch.

Assuming no water is ever released over the spillway, it never rains, and no water is added (from rain, creeks, etc.), over the course of an entire year the lake level would drop 3.5 in. But since we get more than 36" (3 feet) of rain each year, and there's plenty of input from the Creek, etc., and tons of water is lost to evaporation (probably ten to 100 million gallons each day!) and sent over the spillway, the take for a water source is minuscule.

As the first step in painting the house, Greater Saratoga Remodeling has removed the old storm/screen windows. The new storm/screen windows will not be installed until the windows have been repaired and repainted. The absence of window screens will, unfortunately, allow insects into the house, especially in warm weather when we want to have more windows open. We purchased one temporary sliding screen for the kitchen window and will be considering similar temporary options for other windows in the house. A sign will be placed on the sliding doors indicating that they are not to be used for 24 hours after application of the varnish.

Plastic labels have been installed on the new kitchen hood to indicate the functions of the two switches. Installation of the main hood power cut-off switch on the wall has been delayed due to the schedule of the electrician.

I want to remind all members that they are expected to clean up after they use any part of the house. There have been a number of instances this past month when members did not clean up after they used the kitchen and other areas of the house.
