Grounds Report – Great Start!

Hope everyone has gotten their boats wet by now! From today's forecast for our 3rd Sunday race, NW 15 to 25 mph, I'm afraid the inside of my boat will also be wet!

We've accomplished a lot on shore this spring.

At the barn, the old finish flooring was removed in the main bay, revealing an intact middle layer which we can live with for a while. Prior equipment cutouts in the floor and joists were repaired by able carpenters, as was a cracked ceiling joist in the caretaker bay. In the tool room, a caved in ceiling was removed and replaced as well. Along with some general cleanup, the place is looking great.

A dozen new picnic tables were delivered, and our painters did the rest at the club. The boat hoist was painted as well, all mowers and other grounds equipment received some TLC, trees and shrubs were trimmed, stone was added in the Boat Park, and the entire lawn raked.

Along with other tasks that were accomplished, a big thanks to all who pitched in at the work party!

On the subject of boats, please remember all boats or unused trailers, anywhere on the SLSC property, must be identified with an SLSC Tag. If you haven't done so already, please pick up your tags at the clubhouse and apply them accordingly. I will leave them on the credenza by the phone.

Please put your Tag on your trailer if you have an empty trailer on the property because your boat is moored, on a water rack, or for any other reason. As in the past, we will be keeping up our vigil to dispose of abandoned boats, trailers, and equipment over the course of the season. Remember dinghies, canoes, and kayaks also require a Tag, as does any equipment left in the Meadow.

For the Boat Park, I've placed an updated space assignment sheet hanging in the Race Committee Shed. Only minor changes have been made since last season, but please confirm your spot. Because we want to fit in as many boats as possible, please tighten up those spaces within reason. Any questions regarding the Boat Park, or Meadow parking, may be directed to me.

For Board Boat Storage, please follow the recently finalized Policy, available on the SLSC website. Allan Miller has agreed to coordinate arrangements for boat storage on the grass or in the racks. Please forward any questions to Allan. Thanks Allen!

You've probably noticed, one new board boat rack has been built and the design is being assessed, but the primary difference is the ability to roll a boat underneath on it's dolly, in an attempt to keep the lawn area as open as possible. The plan is for older racks to be phased out and new ones built in their place over the course of the next couple of seasons.

Lastly, you may be wondering about all the racket if you're around the club early mornings or early evenings. That's the "GooseBuster" scaring off those persistent pests, hopefully keeping our lawn areas goose poop free! In combination with our doggy silhouettes, so far, so good, but I'm still keeping my fingers crossed. There has been one report of some covert goose activity.


See you on the water, hopefully not in it!

Barging

Our Telltale Editor thinks that "barging" is the most common rule violation in the friendly races on Saratoga Lake. He suggested a reminder that barging is a no-no. Since I have been guilty of barging on numerous occasions, it is appropriate that I communicate this precautionary note.

In the picture, the dotted line is the starting line. The big boat, which is sailing along the starting line, is barging. The big boat is required to keep clear of the little boat, even if this forces the big boat over the starting line. (Boat size is used to distinguish the boats in the illustration. Size is not relevant to barging – Editor.)



The anti-barging rule may seem unfair. The little boat is sailing in an annoying and unkind direction. The little boat could get hurt in a collision, and the big boat will surely steal the little boat's wind. Also, the little boat is maneuverable and could much more easily keep clear. Finally, the big boat will experience a great deal of grief if it is forced over the starting line early.

Despite these sensible arguments, barging is still barging. Don't do it.

The *Racing Rules of Sailing* forbids barging. However, the word "barging" is never mentioned in these official rules. Instead, "no barging" follows from several different rules and definitions. They are paraphrased here.

Definition: Proper course

A boat does not have a proper course before the starting signal.

Because there is no proper course before the start, the little boat can sail in any direction, including the annoying and unkind direction shown in the picture.

Rule 11: On same tack, overlapped

When boats are overlapped, a windward boat shall keep clear of a leeward boat.

This rule applies before and after the start. Thus the big boat must keep clear of the little boat -- even if the little boat sails in the annoying and unkind direction which forces the big boat over the starting line early.

Rule 18: Mark room

Mark room does not apply for a starting mark (either the judge's boat or the pin at the other end).

If the big boat is pinched between a starting mark and the small boat, it is in a hopeless situation. If it hits the mark, that is a violation of the rules. If it forces the little boat to alter course (or hits the little boat) that is also a violation.

Definition: Start

A boat starts as soon as any part of the boat crosses the starting line AFTER THE START SIGNAL.

If the big boat is forced over the starting line early, it has not started. It must return to the proper side of the line to start.

Rule 21.1: Starting errors

A boat returning to the starting line must stay clear of boats which have started.

If the big boat is forced over the line early, it must stay clear of the little boat as it maneuvers back to the starting line.

Editor's Note: When a skipper yells "Stay Up" to you at the start, s(he) is warning you not to barge. If you are being barged at the Committee boat, don't force the barging boat (large or small) to hit you or the Committee boat. Give way and protest the barging boat. Don't think of protesting as griping or poor sportsmanship, think of it as a learning experience! Our protest procedure is informal and open for all to hear.

Canoe and Kayak Policy

Due to the increased number of canoes and kayaks on the property, the board has adopted the following policy. Please remember that every boat needs a current SLSC decal. If you were unable to find your decal during the first work party, please try again. We have printed additional decals for the ones missed the first time. Any boat without a decal by July first may be moved to the meadow.

General

The Saratoga Lake Sailing Club (SLSC) has designated areas to store canoes and kayaks owned by club members. This policy applies to rowing shells and other non-sailing personal watercraft. Canoes and kayaks may be stored on the racks erected by the club. These boats must be stored only on the upper two levels of the rack. The bottom and first level is reserved for board type sailboats such as Sunfish and Lasers. The rack to the south of the play area is for the exclusive use of the sailing school and no member boats may be stored on this rack. Canoes and kayaks may also be stored in the area to the north of the race committee and gasoline shed where tenders for moored boats are stored. Note that the water level in this area is very variable and any watercraft left in this area should be properly secured or elevated on a rack.

It is the responsibility of each member to ensure their boat(s) are positioned to maximize the available space for canoes and kayaks. There are no specific location assignments. As the season gets underway, boats should generally be stored in the same location after each use. Canoes and kayaks boats may not be left on the grass or beach even overnight.

Decals

Each boat stored anywhere on club property must display a valid, annually renewable, SLSC decal affixed to the starboard bow. It is recommended also that paddles, life jackets and any other equipment associated with canoes and kayaks be clearly and permanently marked with the owner's name. SLSC is not responsible for members' personal equipment. Boats failing to show a valid SLSC boat decal by July 1 may be moved to the meadow for storage.

Winter Storage

Canoes and kayaks may be left in the racks for the winter in the location they are during the summer. It is the owner's responsibility to properly protect the boat from the elements.

Oversight

The canoes and kayaks storage area is under the responsibility of the Flag Lt. Grounds who will establish appropriate rules and guidelines to assure the sailing enjoyment of all members.

Board Boat Storage Policy (April-2010)

The following is the new board boat policy. A description of a board boat is included. The intended result of the policy is to keep the sailing club grounds orderly and attractive for all to enjoy. Thank you in advance for your adherence to this, and all club policies.

General

The Saratoga Lake Sailing Club (SLSC) has a designated an area to store board boats such as Lasers and Sunfish and similar boats that weigh less than 150 lbs. Boats may be stored on the racks erected by the club or on a dolly. Board boats may not be left on trailers intended for highway use (these are too heavy for our caretaker to move). Each club member storing a board boat on a dolly is expected to build or purchase a dolly for their boat. SLSC has provided several clearly marked dollies for member's daily use. They are intended for daily use only. Boats may not be left on a club dolly overnight.

It is the responsibility of each member to ensure their boat(s) are lined up in a neat and orderly manner. There are no specific location assignments. As the season gets underway boats should generally be stored in the same location after each use.

Each boat stored anywhere on club property must display a valid, annually renewable, SLSC decal affixed to the starboard bow. Boats failing to show a valid SLSC boat decal by July 1 may be moved to the meadow for storage.
