### **MC** Regattas

MC sailors from Saratoga competed in two regattas on beautiful Keuka Lake this September. Keuka is the "Y"-shaped finger lake -- famous for its wines from Dr. Konstantin Frank, Bully Hill and other vintners.

At the first regatta on September 10, 11 (called the Nor'easter) Saratoga sailors showed a respectable, if not a spectacular performance. Our finish positions (charitably called "mid-fleet") were John Howe #13, Devon Howe #14, John Kimball (that's me) #15 and Charlie Murphy #16. Only 6 points separated John Howe from Charlie Murphy.

These Nor'easter results don't seem right. How can John Howe (who sailed a borrowed boat with defective boards, who capsized at a finish line, and who isn't even eligible to drink Dr. Frank's wine) beat us all?

MC fleets often grow as Laser sailors notice that singlehanded sailing need not be uncomfortable when it is done on an MC. John Howe's performance, which humiliated us all, makes me hesitate when it comes to inviting Laser sailors to join our MC fleet.

The second regatta on September 15, 16 and 17 was the MC National Championship. This is a serious regatta with some pretty serious sailors. For Saratoga MC sailors Charlie Murphy, Devon Howe and John Kimball, this regatta had two phases. Phase one consisted of three interesting races. Phase two was a catastrophic fourth and final race. In phase one, Charlie showed himself to be a potential champion. He was in the running for a trophy. Devon Howe was also doing well. My miserable performance embarrassed everyone.

The regatta hosts provided excellent food and even a raffle. Devon Charlie and I each bought one \$10 ticket. Charlie won nothing. I won a floating keychain, worth about 50cents, and Devon won a new sail. Is that fair? It is fair, because Devon (being the sort of guy who gets things done) arranged for the three of us to stay in a lake camp adjacent the club. Our lodging was the best.

MC sailors are unusually friendly and downright cheerful. All problems are forgotten at the end of a race. Even my dancing partner in my racecourse fiasco was pretty mellow about the experience. Long after I forget my bad sailing, I will remember the sailors. I was talking with one of the older sailors when his father stopped by. This 97 year old gentleman told stories about General Electric in the "old days," which were the 1930's. The next day, I met a sailor with 17 stones in his kidneys. He takes gallons of water along every time he goes sailing to keep his system flushed. He has a video camera mounted near the stern of his boat, so he can review his racing. He could also get a pretty interesting medical video if he started to pass a stone.



## Ensign Fleet 72 Regatta Sept. 10, 2011


