Commodore's Corner

If you haven't seen me around the club most mornings since July 20th, it's because I'm a Backstretch Tour Guide at the Saratoga Race Course. The backstretch is the most beautiful place at the track.

The backstretch is on the opposite side of the race track from the Clubhouse and Grandstand, and includes 91 barns with 1,800 stalls and dormitories for 1,000 backstretch workers. Each day begins at dawn, and nearly 3,000 people are busy working—including trainers, exercise riders, grooms, hot-walkers, jockeys, agents, assistant starters schooling young horses at the starting gate, owners, veterinarians, farriers, cooks in the backstretch kitchen, and many others.

On the very first day of organized racing at Saratoga, the opening race was won by a gray mare, Lady Suffolk. Lady Suffolk immediately became a hero in Saratoga. Later, she was raced far beyond her prime, prompting songwriter Stephen Foster to pen the tune, "The Old Gray Mare, She Ain't What She Used to Be." How did the Oklahoma Track get its name? Who are the four horses buried at the track? Take the tour, and find out. It's a great way for locals and out-of-town visitors, alike, to learn about the workings and history of the Saratoga Race Course.

Backstretch tours are free to the public. There are no tours on dark days (Tuesdays—no racing), Travers Stakes Day, Labor Day, or when it's raining. The first tour departs from the Nelson Avenue entrance opposite the Circle of Jockeys at 7:30 a.m. A tram drops visitors off at the backstretch for a 40-minute walking tour. The last tour departs at 9:00 a.m. If you haven't been on a Backstretch Tour, you should consider taking one. You'll be happy you did.

July 18-19th: Malletts Bay Boat Club in Vermont "MBBC Junior Regatta"

Participating from SLSC:

Brett and Piotr teamed up to sail the "Purple Duck" and finished strong.

After some flashes of brilliance yesterday (best finish was 4th out of 28 boats), they started today with some very poor starts. In the first two races they managed to get 20th out of 28...yikes. But after some "coaching" (my yelling at them to get some clean air down at the pin end), they managed to get a good start and 6th in the next race. The races were very short and a good start was 80% of the battle. In the last race of the day, they got a great start and sailed toward a puff on the left which turned-out to be header, so they tacked and were able to port tack the entire fleet and rounded the first mark in first place. They were chased by two boats on the down wind, but they FINALLY were able to get their spinnaker working for them and did an "auto gybe" (big wind shift that forced the main to switch tacks without their planning), so they successfully gybed the spinnaker without losing much steam and then took-off like a rocket, leaving the other boats on the old tack and struggling to gybe too late. They rounded the leeward pin ahead by about 20 boat lengths and coasted to any easy bullet!

They were so excited that they were able to pull together what they learned during the two days: getting clear air at the start, sailing to the dark water and tacking on headers, then successfully flying the chute and gybing...it was fun to see them grow their skills.

They finished 13th overall, but have confidence that they will make a good showing at the Cheeseburger regatta next week-end. By the way, they expect over 50 FJ's at this regatta!!!

Day 1: 31 FJ sailboats descended on the North Lake George Yacht Club (NLGYC) in Hauge, NY. Boats came from Mallet's Bay Boat Club (VT), Lake Champlain Club, The Lake George Club, SLSC and NLGYC. After periods of light rain and low winds, the weather improved. The rain came again, but without thunder so the regatta started. The starts were a little intimidating to most of these sailors, as 31 boats and 62 kids, many of them yelling "up, up" and "starboard," were bobbing and weaving their way to the starting line. Our coach, Aaron Holland, provided some much needed advice.

Day 2: The rain went away and the wind improved to 8-10 knots, perfect for these young sailors. Again, Colby Vickerson put on a clinic with a first place finish in each race. Brett and Piotr improved and had a 3th place finish in one race after starting to master the spinnaker. Helaina and Eli got a few good starts and even rounded the first windward mark in 4th place (way ahead of her brother, she might add). But since she did not use a spinnaker, her chanced dimmed on the downwind legs. Helaina is a little more gutsy than most kids, so she tended to run the line on port, then stuff her boat into a hole on a starboard tack. Overall, all of the junior sailors got some great experience in a large regatta, including some great coaching by Aaron Holland. Brett and Piotr finished in 8th place and Helaina was a little South of mid-fleet. The kids had lots of fun and made new friends.

Day 1: 11 FJ sailboats and 6 "420s" came from Mallet's Bay Boat Club, Lake Champlain Club, SLSC and NLGYC. The winds were very light which was perfect for Luka and his skipper from Lake Sunapee. They sailed to the right and caught some nice pressure and rounded the windward mark in first place by 30 boat lengths. Even without a spinnaker, they coasted to a bullet in the first race. Brett and Piotr won the second race due to a good start and solid spinnaker work. They were winning the third race but the wind dropped to near zero and they drifted too wide around the leeward mark and got passed by two boats with more boat speed as the other boats rounded the mark with better sail trim and cut sharply past the mark (learning moment #1: mark rounding).

Day 2: With no wind in the morning, it looked like the races would be cancelled. The junior sailors were treated to multiple racing workshops, including rules (I learned something), knots, tactics, etc. Then a miracle blast of wind appeared later and it quickly cranked to 12-15. Hannah injured her leg and was a little nervous about the wind, so her boat retired. Luka and his guest had a hard time taming their boat in the brisk wind. Brett and Piotr had a great start in the first race and again rounded the first mark all alone. However, when the raised the chute, they quickly found out that they lacked a necessary ingredient for a successful downwind leg - the spinnaker pole! (learning moment #2: check your equipment). They made it back to shore and got the pole...and had a great start heading to a huge puff on the left. They tacked to

port - almost on layline - then tried to pinch on a starboard tack to make the windward mark first...however, they lost boat speed then drifted sideways and hit the mark (been there...done that!)...(learning moment #3: mark rounding). Brett and Piotr's competition for 2nd place was betting on light air but they found themselves frequently standing on the centerboard of their capsized boat during day 2, taking them out of contention. So Brett and Piotr finished in 2nd place, Luka and Guest finished a strong 5th place, while Helaina and Hanna got DFL. All of the kids made new friends, got reacquainted with old ones and learned some sailing skills....all-in-all, a great trip to a very nice club with especially nice people.

The kids would like to thank the Club and the Sailing School for purchasing new sails and a framework for a trailer that enabled us to take all three FJs on one trailer.
