And...they're off!

It's time to take a backstretch tour at Saratoga Race Course.

The backstretch is on the opposite side of the race track from the Clubhouse and Grandstand, and includes 91 barns with 1,800 stalls and dormitories for 1,000 backstretch workers. Each day begins at dawn, and nearly 2,500 people are busy working—including trainers, exercise riders, grooms, hot-walkers, jockeys, agents, assistant starters schooling young horses at the starting gate, owners, veterinarians, farriers, cooks in the backstretch kitchen, and many others.

Backstretch tours are free to the public. There are no tours on dark days (Tuesdays—no racing), Travers Stakes Day, Labor Day, or when it's raining. The first tour departs from the Nelson Avenue entrance opposite the Circle of Jockeys at 7:30 a.m. A tram drops visitors off at the backstretch for a 30-minute walking tour. The last tram departs for the backstretch at 9:00 a.m.

If you're lucky, I'll be your tour guide. If not, I'll see you at the Labor Day Lobster Boil!

SLSC FJ Horse Race Regatta 2013 - Recap

This was our 3rd year sponsoring the FJ Horse Race for our Junior Sailing Team. In 2011, we filled our 3 boats and let Community Sailing (Burlington, VT) Juniors borrow our other 3 for a total of 6 boats in the one-day regatta. In 2012, we filled 4 of our boats, loaned the other two to Community Sailing and welcomed Lake George Club Juniors with their two boats for a total of 8 boats in the regatta. This year, we filled all 6 of our FJs with qualified junior racers from SLSC and welcomed 3 boats from Mallet's Bay Boat Club (Burlington, VT) and 3 from Lake George Club for a total of 12 boats. The larger fleet made the racing more fun and competitive for the Junior sailors this year.

The event was held on Friday, July 12^{th.} The kids from Mallet's Bay came the night before to rig-up and relax. We welcomed them with pizza, S'mores and a movie in the clubhouse. They slept at the club which they really appreciated. The weather was perfect for the regatta the next morning....light winds out of the North and mostly sunny skies...not too hot. The Lake George boats arrived in the morning and rigged their boats quickly. We had lunch and then set out to get at least 5 races underway. The Juniors normally sail a windward-leeward course in 1 lap over about 20-30 minutes, which is the course we set for them.

The lightest team was from Mallet's Bay Boat club which included an Opti sailor who had never sailed an FJ. She made her presence quickly as she was in the lead in several early races. However, the SLSC team of Piotr Czajkowski and Shea Weilbaker dominated the down-wind leg of the course, keeping near perfect boat balance and optimizing their chute work. They came from mid-fleet to the front of the pack on several occasions as a result of the downwind leg. Brett Howe and David Hamlin from SLSC had some streaks of brilliance (it is always "brilliance" when you make a scientific-wild-assguess about which direction the next shift will come from) rounding the windward mark in the top three on several races.

The team of Helaina Howe (Brett's sister) and Austin Wyles mostly beat Brett Howe and David Hamlin, but had a two bad races which caused them to finish only 3 points behind (whew, the dinner table at the Howe house could have been a dangerous place for Brett). Andrew Welcome and Hannah Merrill from SLSC had some great moments too. They worked their spinnaker well to overtake some unlucky sailors downwind. Also from SLSC, Eli Fisher and Luka Newton were somewhat inexperienced in racing, but found some nice grooves in the upwind legs, rounding the first mark in top position by 20 boat lengths in one particular race. Drake McDonough and Ian Davis, also from SLSC were new to racing and gained some confidence as sailors as they managed to beat one challenger from Mallet's Bay.

Overall, the team of Piotr and Shea dominated the regatta with only 6 points (four bullets and a 2nd). Since we sailed 6 races, we included the throw-out provision.

There are many people to thank for making this regatta possible. The Junior sailing team were able to sail with spinnakers this year due to the hard work of Aaron Holland and Peter Hudson (and the money from the program) in rigging the boats. We must also thank our race committee which included Bruce Blackie, Mark Welcome, Aaron Holland and Peter Hudson.
