Commodore's Corner By Vic Roberts

In December 2011 I visited past Commodores Randy and Elli Rice at The Rice Paddy. Randy had invited me over to transfer some old SLSC documents. Some of the documents provided by Randy were used to create the History section of the SLSC website. One of the items Randy gave me was an India ink drawing labeled Saratoga Lake Sailing Club; we could not read the name of the artist.

Kathleen and I were so taken by the drawing that I added it to the home page of the SLSC website. At the time I posted the drawing I thought the view was from our current location.

In April of this year we received a letter from past Commodore Dave Hidinger. Dave told us that the drawing was part of a publicity brochure put together by John Hause and a person with the last name of McGraw in 1971. This is when the Club was at the old Kaydeross Park site. We searched the Club records, including the Equity Bond Register, and could not find any person with the last name of McGraw who was a member at our current location.

In June, Dave solved our problem in a second letter, which had a copy of the text side of the brochure attached. Dave had determined that the artist was John McGraw, and had searched old Club rosters that yielded interesting additional information. For example, John McGraw and his wife Maureen joined the Club in 1970 and sailed an International 14 named Taboo. They are listed on the 1971 & 1972 rosters, but in 1972 no boat is listed. John Hause is listed on the 1969 roster and also sailed an International 14. Dave does not have earlier rosters so we do not know when John Hause joined the Club. Hause is listed on the 1971 & 1972 rosters, but in 1972 his listing included the name of his wife, Diane, and he now sailed a Thistle named Mello. In 1972 John Hause was head of the Publicity Committee and served on the Executive Committee as Member at Large. (A position we no longer have.)

Dave told us that he was so taken with the drawing that he framed an original brochure with the drawing side out and has it hanging in his home. The copy of the brochure sent by Dave Hidinger, which is only the text side of the original, has been posted to the History section of the SLSC website.

We want to thank Dave Hidinger for his research and for providing this information about the drawing. It is no longer artist and date unknown. If anyone has more recent information about John McGraw or John Hause, please contact me.

Grounds Report

We had a successful work party on Saturday July 18th. The boat park was aligned and numbers were painted in front of the spaces. The number stakes at the back of the spaces may not be in line with the spaces and will be realigned at a later date. There are few empty spots that I will be assigning to new members in the next few days. There were six volunteers working on this project.

It was brought to my attention that some member moved another Flying Scot and damaged the tiller. The owner is doing additional inspection to see if there is any more damage. Please do not move another member's boat without myself or someone I appoint to assist. This will avoid this situation in the future.

The meadow had all but 3 boats moved and the entire area mowed by another 6 members. You will notice that the center of the meadow is almost completely empty. All of the boats and trailer have been aligned around the perimeter and can be accessed without moving any other boat or trailer. This was by design. One of the projects for the fall work party will be to place matting in the center and to cover this matting by 3 inches of stone. We feel that this will go a long way toward firming this storage area. This is the same process that has been used near the crane.

If you have a trailer in the meadow that does not have your name on it, please make it before the fall work party. This will allow us to get rid of junkers and give us more room.

We did not have time to go through the dingy area and the lawn and boat racks to check for boats that no longer have current memberships. We will be sending an email looking for help. This will most likely be an evening project of 4 -5 members for about 2 hours.

One final note, the volunteers thank all of the members that have air in their tires.

Mosquitos

A club member has suggested having martin houses installed as a way to control the mosquitos. The following information is from the Purple Martin Conservation Association.

"Martins, like all swallows, are aerial insectivores. They eat only flying insects, which they catch in flight. Their diet is diverse, including dragonflies, damselflies, flies, midges, mayflies, stinkbugs, leafhoppers, Japanese beetles, June bugs, butterflies, moths, grasshoppers, cicadas, bees, wasps, flying ants, and ballooning spiders. Martins are not, however, prodigious consumers of mosquitoes as is so often claimed by companies that manufacture martin housing. An intensive 7-year diet study conducted at PMCA headquarters in Edinboro, PA, failed to find a single mosquito among the 500 diet samples collected from parent martins bringing beak full of insects to their young. The samples were collected from martins during all hours of the day, all season long, and in numerous habitats, including mosquito-infested ones. Purple Martins and freshwater mosquitoes rarely ever cross paths. Martins are daytime feeders, and feed high in the sky; mosquitoes, on the other hand, stay low in damp places during daylight hours, or only come out at night."

"Housing should be placed in the center of the most open spot available, about 30-120 feet from human housing. There should be no trees taller than the martin housing within 40 feet, preferably 60 feet.

An alternative would be to setup some bat houses.



The following information is from the Organization for Bat Conservation web site http://www.batconservation.org/

Bat houses in the Northeast United States should be Attached at least 15 feet high Free from obstructions with at least 20 feet of open space Facing south to southeast to gain exposure to sunlight Painted black or left natural Receive at least 6-8 hours of sunlight each day

Bats return from migration and awaken from hibernation as early as March in most of the U.S. They will be abundant throughout the summer and early fall. Approximately half of all bat houses are occupied within the first summer and up to 80% are occupied within the first 2-3 years.

We could place bat houses in the meadow and at the north end of the boat park.
