Saratoga Lake Sailing Foundation

We are excited to announce the creation of the Saratoga Lake Sailing Foundation. The Foundation is a separate but affiliated organization whose primary function is to promote and support sailing in the Saratoga Lake region through its fundraising efforts. The Foundation is a 501(c)(3) charitable corporation and donations are tax deductible.

Although recently formed, the foundation is already very active. We have received 3 donated boats. A member of the community who came to our open house last summer enjoyed it so much she made a donation to the foundation as part of her annual giving. Our first grant has been awarded.

Town of Malta Foundation and Global Foundries have approved a grant that will allow us to offer FREE sailing classes to all town of Malta residents.

The "Invitation-To-Sail" is designed for those new to sailing who would just like a little taste of what it is like to be out in a sailboat. This will be a one session class designed to introduce the student to sailing to decide if it is something they would like to pursue. The class can be taken by individuals or we can take groups or families so you can experience sailing together. Classes are scheduled for evenings in May and June.

September Grounds Report

As we roll into 2016, the planning for projects begins. This year the priority will be to clean up the dingy area and install a rack system for the canoes, kayaks and lighter dingys. The process will be to grind out all of the stumps and remove a couple of trees. Then we will build a 1 tier rack for the entire 75 foot area. Last year there were 30 boats stored in the area and allowing 5 foot per we would need 150 feet. It is open for discussion about assigning rack spaces just like the moorings. We may want to consider putting matting down under the rack and covering it with sand to eliminate some of the mud. I would appreciate any and all input to make this as easy to use as possible.



The rack would be 4 to 6 feet deep based upon your input. There will also be stringers available to go front to back as shown in the far left rack.

As everyone must have noticed, there is a pipe under the driveway that was raised by last year's deep frost. As soon as the frost is out of the ground this spring, we will be repairing this drainage pipe. It will mean that the driveway will be closed for a day. There will be an email to everyone once we have a date.

If the lake freezes, we will be scheduling a work party to reinstall the fence when the ice breaks. If it does not freeze, we will plan on a Saturday in the middle of April since the first work party will be April 30th this year. The fence has been working at keeping the geese at bay.
