As we wrap up our season, we would like to share some of the accomplishments of our Sailing School.

To give you an idea of the scope of our school, the sailing school had a great year, sharing our love of sailing with 361 new sailors. Thanks to the Town of Malta Foundation, 159 Malta residents got to try their hand at sailing for the first time for free. So many of our neighbors did not even know we existed. Sixteen of them went on to sign up for full classes. Three of our students went on to become members this year.

Our junior sailors continue to be a point of great pride. Watching the progression from kids at camp, to capable racers, counselors and junior sailing instructors is a remarkable journey. Another group has moved on to college. It seems impossible but kids I remember as campers and instructors are now college graduates and newlyweds. The juniors bring an energy to our club that can seem overwhelming when in full swing but leaves a void when they are gone.

The dedicated volunteers and employees of the sailing school have created a tremendous program. Our sailing school continues to bring diverse and enthusiastic new members to our club. The amount of time, work and finesse that goes into such a program is staggering: registrations, scheduling, keeping kids safe on the water and entertained on land, boats in good repair, parents reassured, and adult learners encouraged. It is a year round endeavor and while we are wrapping up sailing, they are beginning the planning for next year. (It is never too early to register!)

Grounds October 2016

Oh the disappointment of having to put the summer toys away. Unfortunately we have to take the docks out on the 22nd. This means that we will have our usual fall work party tasks of storing the canopy and geese fence. There is also some debris in the meadow to be placed into the dumpster to make room for a couple of more boats.

This year we will be continuing placing matting and stone on another section of the meadow. The plan is to cover the southern portion between the tree line and the middle section that got gravel and matting last year. During the July work party this area was filled with all of the empty trailers. When you trailer your boat, please place it on the gravel in the middle or the north side of the meadow. This will be a tight squeeze. You can move your boat back into the area after the gravel has been spread. We would like to have the area clear by Sunday the 16th. This will allow us time to get the matting installed before the gravel is delivered on Thursday the 20th. I have outlined the area on the photo below.



For the last 3 years we have been working to get an evaluation and to develop a long range plan for our trees. We hired an arborist give us an evaluation of our trees and to recommend what trees to plant for replacement of trees that we have had to remove over the year. The evaluation has been completed and the board is reviewing the details at this time and we are getting clarification to a few of the questions the report has posed. You may see numbers painted on some trees around the house, lower lawn and trees with an "X" marking along the area where the Ensigns store their boats for the winter. These trees were identified as posing the highest risk for causing damage to persons or property. These trees either need dead branches removed, to receive treatment that will eliminate problems such as insect infestations and disease, or potentially to be removed. Other trees have been identified to have trimming and treatment as well but are of a lower risk. Recommendations of replacement trees are based upon how the area is used, such as parking, camping or boat storage.

If you want to see the raw data, let me know and I can forward it to you. We should have the plan available in a final form for all of the members by the Annual Membership Meeting in December.



2016 STRIDE Sail program

We had 14 kids this year - a record after nearly 10 years - in that time, we have taught an average of 10 kids five lessons each or 500, over 9 years as we complete this season's effort. This also provides parents "respite" of two hours per each kid, so their child gets a safe, reliable, life-impacting experience, and they (parents) can have a little time alone not to worry and maybe get out to dinner shop, read, sleep, whatever, because they can't find typical babysitters for an evening out, but STRIDE Sail provides that opportunity as an added benefit.

August brought us four successful nights of a little socialization, basic water craft handling safety, knot tying and eventually sailing in nice light conditions except for night three which followed the club regatta in which the wind was too much for us to race the day before and carried through. Our regatta day was windless so we had to do what we always do when there is no wind and make the most of it. I'm not sure the kids really minded. We paddled, played games, ate some burgers and dogs and a big congratulatory cake.

Many of these kids struggle to participate in typical little league or team sports; they are simply too impulsive and have trouble processing and focusing on game progressions, as they are easily distracted. My son was that way and you wouldn't know it today thanks to STRIDE, he can even play adaptive baseball currently with another group on Saturday mornings.

Where would this program be without the support of the Saratoga Lake Sailing Club – much more than a partner? It is the people who make everything so great and people who make the STRIDE Sail program a success. I need to mention them, before I forget, and over the years there have been several dozen who have sustained this effort such that naming them all would take a page alone. This year we had the continued support of veterans - Emmett McCarthy, Tony Canone and Mary-Kate McCarty and Anthony Benson - without whose generosity, in so many ways, this program would simply not work. We also had a great group young people volunteering, their time, and their knowledge, year over year to sustain this program - its good to see young people so generous Luka Newton, Peter Cjaikowski, Corbett Churan. Abby and Emma Benson.
