Sailing Foundation Update

It has been awhile since I gave an update on the Saratoga Lake Sailing Foundation, so I apologize for slacking. For those of you who are unfamiliar "the Foundation"/SLSF is a separate but affiliated organization whose primary function is to promote and support sailing in the Saratoga Lake region through its fundraising efforts. The Foundation is a 501(c)(3) charitable corporation and donations are tax deductible (I'm told by people much smarter than me that I must add "to the extent allowed law by law" every time I say tax deductible).

A few highlights:

- We are continuing to accept donations of boats. In 2016 we accepted donations of 10 boats, some of which are being used in the school and some of which are in the process of being cleaned up for sale in order to raise funds for other projects. So far in 2017, we have accepted donations of 2 boats which will be sold for fundraising.
- We are extremely grateful to those members who elected to donate to the Foundation as part of their annual renewal process. A number of members graciously donated approximately \$2000 to the Foundation so far this year. Additionally, several members took advantage of "dollars for doing" type programs whereby the employers donate money to charitable organizations that the employee/retiree donates their time to. We certainly appreciate any Club members who can check with their employers to see if they have such programs.
- The Foundation is actively seeking grants to supplement the funds already raised to support the Sailing School in a refresh of the Learn to Sail fleet. The school would like to move towards lower maintenance boats for the junior Learn to Sail classes, as the new sailors tend to be a little rough on the Lasers.
- The Foundation is once again working with the Sailing School to offer free sailing lessons to residents of the Town of Malta. The "Invitation-To-Sail" is designed for those new to sailing who would just like a little taste of what it is like to be out in a sailboat. This will be a one session class designed to introduce the student to sailing to decide if it is something they would like to pursue. The class can be taken by individuals or we can take groups or families so you can experience sailing together. Many thanks to the Global Foundries Town of Malta Foundation for funding this effort.

Congratulations to Brett Howe, Drew Welcome, Piotr Czajkowski, Eli Fisher, Jacoba Taylor, Corbett Churan and Luka Newton for obtaining their level 2 certification. A major component of the Level 2 course included how to deal with difficult situations. The instructor and I were very impressed with their maturity and their thoughtfulness throughout the training. I'm proud to have this group of young men and women teaching for us.

As always, we'd like to remind everyone to please sign up either yourselves or your family members as soon as possible. We are now starting to hear from many members who would like to get themselves or others into the classes. While we certainly always try to accommodate members and get them into whatever classes they would like, calling us sooner rather than later is always appreciated. Also please remember that we offer instruction for both beginner and experienced racers to club members for next to nothing (\$50/week) as a service to the Club in support of the racing program. They are great classes and a bargain,

The Great Loop

Courageous, a 39 foot Mainship Trawler, is our retirement boat. This will be our 5th summer with Courageous and we keep learning things about her seemingly every time we're aboard. We've taken a number of day trips on the Hudson River and Erie Canal as well as a couple of longer trips. One of our longer trips was one of 11 days over to Seneca Lake and back home and another trip of 33 days where we crossed Lake Ontario and cruised down the St Lawrence to the Richelieu River which led us south to Lake Champlain and then to our home marina on the Hudson.

However, things are about to change on July 1st. We have a plan to live aboard Courageous for the next year. If all goes well we will be traveling about 6000 miles in a big circle around the eastern US and a portion of Canada. The route is called The Great Loop and AGLCA (the American Great Loop Cruiser's Association) estimates about 130 boats complete the Loop each year.

The Loop is most generally traveled counter-clockwise because of predominant currents on the rivers that are involved. There are many side trips that can be taken while traveling on the Loop and there are anchorages and marinas where boaters might stay one night or layover for days or even weeks. So it's difficult to estimate exactly where you might be at any given time.

We'll leave our home port at Coeymans and cruise up to Oswego on the New York State canal system and then cross over Lake Ontario to Trenton, Ontario. The next stage involves crossing the Province of Ontario to Georgian Bay and Lake Huron via the Trent-Severn Waterway.

After entering Lake Michigan near Mackinac Island we will head south to Chicago either on the Michigan or Wisconsin side of the lake.

Then after visiting Chicago we'll head down the Chicago River to the Illinois River to the Mississippi, Ohio River, Tennessee River and down the Tom-Bigbee Waterway to Mobile Bay by winter.

Loopers generally spend the winter in the Florida area and then in spring head north on the Intracoastal Waterway.

Arriving back at your home port is called "crossing your wake." If all goes well we should be crossing our wake in June or July of 2018 which will allow us to change our white AGLCA bow burgee to a gold one.

We would then be graduating members of the Class of 2018.



The Wacky Y Flyer - What's with Those Extra Jib Sheets?

As a sailboat design and as a group of sailors, the Y Flyers are, ummm, different. One of the different (I like to think charming) aspects of the design is its use of "barber haulers" to fine tune the jib.




Named for the Barber brothers of San Diego, renowned Lightening sailors in the 1950's, the barber hauler is basically an extra block that the jib sheet passes through. The block is attached to a line that can haul the sheet outboard. In the Y Flyer, that line is typically led back to the same set of cam cleats as the jib sheets, with the sheets above, and the haulers below. The position of the barber hauler determines the direction in which the jib sheet is pulling, and thus largely determines the angle of the jib, while the sheet largely determines the camber, or curve of the jib. Clear as mud? Perhaps the following diagrams will help.

Here we see the barber hauler eased, basically having no effect. The position of the jib sheet block determines the angle of the sail. On the Y Flyer, that

block is positioned fairly far inboard, allowing a narrow angle without flattening the sail too much, allowing good power and good pointing going upwind.



When headed downwind, the barber hauler is tightened, essentially replacing the jib




And those are the basics of the barber hauler! In general, it is eased going upwind, and tightened going downwind, just the opposite of the sheet. Between the two, one has exquisite control over the position and the shape of the jib, the better to urge our Flyers onward ever faster!

I hope you've enjoyed this gentle introduction to a slightly quirky, but very useful, sail control. See you on the water!
