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Is your boat ready for the season?

Taking a walk around the club, looking at the boats was an education and a reminder about the coming winter. Many of the boats are well prepared for the winter but there are still some that need attention. The damage that water left in a boat when it freezes and thaws can be substantial. Areas like the mast hole on a Laser or Sunfish can fill with water that expands with the temperature changes and can cause significant damage. Some boats have roller jibs. These need to come down in the winter. High winds can unravel the sail and then beat it until it is totally destroyed. The winds can loosen the covers you have put on your boats, too, so picking a nice day and checking the covers periodically is a small investment in protecting your boat.

If you have not secured your covers yet, doing it sooner than later...well, you know what the next words will say.

It helps, also, to protect your boat from the critters, aka wildlife. If your boat has inspection ports that, when open won't collect water, get some non-metallic screen fabric and tape it over the openings. It is a great way to dry the interior of the boat over the winter.

Consider, also, what you leave in the boat. Even synthetic fabric sails can get moldy if they stay wet for an entire winter. It is interesting how mice like chewing on some ropes or shredding them and using it for nesting. Storing the vulnerable material where it is well protected will be worth it.

Hopefully, this brief disjointed bunch of information will be useful to you. Consider, also, that as we continue for what is hopefully a short while isolating, learning the racing rules can be really worthwhile. SLSC Boat Storage Policy - Introduction for Telltale

The Board has prepared a document that sets forth the policy that applies to all members who keep boats at the Club. This policy document incorporates and supplements the existing Boat Park Policy and Mooring Policy. SLSC Policies can be found in the Member Manual, which will be updated to include this new document.

Boats stored at the Club, whether in the boat park, on a mooring, on a water rack, on the lawn, in the Car Park area, in the meadow, on a rack, or on the dinghy dock, are subject to this policy.

Changes and additions to the number of boats left at the Club require Board approval. All boats and trailers left at the Club must be prominently identified with the owner's name.

These boat storage policies are not new policies, but rather are a codification of existing policies. The current situation at the Club, with membership near maximum limits and a list of applicants waiting to be accepted into the Club, while the envy of other sailing clubs, does put pressure on our facilities. In particular, we have very limited space to store members' boats on site in both summer and winter.

We want to remind members that the storage and location of boats and trailers on land are at the discretion of the Flag Lieutenant Grounds, and the storage and location of boats on moorings and water racks are at the discretion of the Rear Commodore. Assigned locations may change from year to year; no one "owns" a parking or mooring spot no matter how long they may have squatted on it.

This is not to say that there will be massive or random changes to boat locations, but to remind members that boat locations may be changed due to the needs of the Club.

Members should have no expectation that boats or trailers will not be moved during the course of Club operation. Boats or trailers may be moved by officers and work parties. The Club will attempt to notify owners of boats, especially those on jack-stands, before moving them.

SLSC Power Boat Training for 2021

Our goal at SLSC for 2021 is to have, at least one individual from each member family, trained to safely handle our powerboats. The primary reason for this, is to assure we can safely rescue people in a boat on the water if the need arises. Our approach is to provide a combination of on-the-water operation training in our boats, combined with additional training via articles and classroom, in techniques to rescue people and boats.

The winter break from sailing provides us time to get started working toward this goal. Additionally, New York State is phasing in the requirement, that by the end of 2025 every operator of a powerboat, regardless of age or year of birth, will need to have a Boater Safety Certificate issued by an approved training program.

Later in the season, when the ability to hold classroom training is safe, the club will conduct several free NYS Boater Safety Classes to allow those members who want the Certificate to obtain it. Those who want an on-line course, have some choices which are listed on the NYS Parks Recreation and Historic Preservation website.

https://parks.ny.gov/recreation/boating/education.aspx The Boat US course is free to take the course. I think though that a fee is charged to receive a Certificate.

We will also be providing periodic articles on Powerboat operation. This will supplement the Boater Safety Course information for all members, including those not taking the Certificate course.

Accomplishing this goal will take some help. If you are interested in becoming a NY State Boater Safety Instructor or a US Powerboating Safe Powerboat Handling Instructor, please contact me.

If you were born on or after: You will need a boating safety certificate by:

January 1, 1993 The end of 2020

January 1, 1988 The end of 2022

January 1, 1983 The end of 2023

January 1, 1978 The end of 2024

All operators of motorized vessels, regardless of age, will need a boating safety certificate by the end of 2025.
