Week 6 #FairSailing Scenarios and Level II Rules Quiz

With the ILYA Championships approaching, we're wrapping up #FairSailing 2019 with a final set of scenarios and a new rules quiz. Here's the sixth and final set of scenarios for #FairSailing 2019. These scenarios involve



protests and redress, from Part 5. The scenarios are from <u>Dave Perry's 100</u> <u>Best Racing Rules Quizzes</u>. Thanks to Dave for granting permission to use his material!

Want to test your knowledge of the Racing Rules of Sailing? The #FairSailing team has created a Level II quiz to supplement last year's quiz. The questions are based on the scenarios in this summer's #FairSailing articles. Pass the Level II quiz (70% or better) and get an ILYA gaiter! Scenario 1 - Hail

Boat S (on starboard tack) bears away to avoid hitting Boat P (on port tack) and intends to protest. S immediately shouts out P's name and displays her protest flag, notifies P onshore that a protest will be filed and delivers her protest form within the required time. At the hearing, in response to questioning from the protest committee, S states that she did not hail the actual word "protest" because she was confident that P was fully aware that she intended to protest. You are on the protest committee; how would you

















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decide this? (From Perry, Quiz 69)

Scenario 2 - Redress #1

During a race, the race committee observes Boats A and B go around a mark the wrong way. The race committee does not give them a horn as they finish and scores them "Did not finish" (DNF) for not sailing the course properly. The boats request redress under rule 62.1(a), Redress, claiming that they did in fact finish properly. You are on the protest committee; how would you decide this? (From Perry, Quiz 73)

Scenario 3 - Redress #2

Boats P (on port tack) and S (on starboard tack), intending to race, are sailing about in the racing area 15 minutes before their starting signal. Accidentally P collides with S, putting a large hole in S's topside. S was unable to avoid the collision once it was clear that P was not keeping clear. S hails, "Protest!" and flies her protest flag immediately and sails back to shore. Once ashore, S files a protest against P under rules 10, On Opposite Tacks, and 14, Avoiding Contact, and a request for redress under rule 62.1(b), Redress. You are on the protest committee; how would you decide this? (From Perry, Quiz 76)

Scenario 4 - Hearings

In a post-race conversation, the helmsman of Boat X complains to a member of the protest committee that he clearly saw another boat in his race, Boat Y, touch the gybe mark and not take a penalty turn. The protest committee member therefore decides to protest Y for an alleged breach of rule 31, Touching a Mark. Y is informed that she is being protested, and the protest is filed within the time limit. You are on the protest committee; how would you decide this? (From Perry, Quiz 79)

In the senior fleet there were no tipovers during actual racing. Yes, some went over during the pre-start maneuvering but they capably got the boats up and sailing. The senior PRO commented this is the first regatta in memory where the numbers who sailed increased during the day. With each race, more of the onlooking sailors determined they could race this to the finish. What a great group of senior sailors.

The junior fleet was no less courageous. Tucked in a bit more sheltered water, the 6-8 year olds handled the day -- but the No Tears might not have applied universally. STILL- THEY PERSISTED.

The entire day demonstrates the skill, knowledge and passion of our coaches. To a person, those coaches deserve every penny we pay them. Parents were on the perimeter of the course and the coaches got the most from every sailor. The coaches knew when to say, "WHEN" and when to say, "YOU CAN DO THIS!" Two morning races followed by two afternoon races with little attrition shows the control of the day's events - again due to the coaches. Thanks to Cedar, coaches and parents for entrusting your young sailors to those on the water.



Attention Optimist Sailors, Coaches and Parents

As the ILYA Optimist Championship is approaching, the ILYA Optimist Committee is working to ensure an exceptional regatta. We expect that we will have great racing with lots of parents and coaches there to cheer on and support the sailing. Knowing this, and knowing that the 2020 ILYA Championship is at Beulah where traffic control will be paramount to fair racing, we as the Optimist Committee have created a set of Support Boat Rules to help the sailors have racing that is fair and avoids interference from powerboat traffic.

What does this mean for me?

 During Racing, all traffic will operate at speeds no greater than slowno-wake.

- Coaches and Spectator boats will have different rules.
- Coaches will be required to:
 - Register their boats during the registration period
 - Attend the Support Boat Briefing following the competitor's briefing.
 - Stay 150' from the racing area, buoy roundings, and the finish.
 - Wear USCG approved PFDs at all times
 - Wear kill cords at all times.
 - o Carry required safety gear
 - Comply with all other rules listed in the ILYA Support Boat Rules
 Read them, this list is not complete.
- Spectators will be required to:
 - Register their boats during the registration period
 - Attend the Support Boat Briefing following the competitor's briefing
 - Stay 175' from the racing area, buoy roundings, and the finish
- Penalties may be assessed on Coaches, Spectators, and/or Sailors if these rules are violated

Please rest assured, our goal here is to keep the racing truly excellent for the sailors. While penalties are a possibility, we are confident our Coaches and Spectators will quickly learn this system. We are confident that verbal warnings will quickly correct any violations of these rules. We have a truly excellent group that supports our junior sailing in the ILYA. Let's work together to create great habits during the 2019 sailing season. Working together, we will help have fantastic racing at White Bear and in the future.

ILYA Optimist Dinghy Championships

More than 100 sailors are registered for next week's 2019 ILYA IOD Championship Regatta at the White Bear Lake Yacht Club and White Bear Lake Sailing School. We are excited to be hosting this event and have lots of fun and great sailing planned for this beautiful venue!



A few important items we would like to highlight:

- Check In and Registration will be on Sunday, July 28, 2019 from 1:00 pm until 7:00 p.m. at White Bear Lake Yacht Club (56 Dellwood Ave, Dellwood, MN 55110). Your boat MUST be certified at this location before it can be launched. Launching instructions will be given once you have checked in and your boat has been inspected. ALL coaches must also check in at registration to receive coach boat launch instructions.
- Once you rig and register your boat, join us for an afternoon of swimming in the WBYC pool, yard games and fun with friends. Club House Grill and Bar will be open with food and drinks for purchase.
- Sunday, July 28, 3:00 pm Practice race at 3:00 and Opening Ceremonies at 6:00 at the Flag Pole.
- Be sure to visit the nearby Boat Works Commons in downtown White Bear Lake, a museum of scow sailing on the site of Johnson Boat Works, the birthplace of scow sailing. The Commons will be open Sunday from 1-4 pm. Directions will available at registration.
- Due to parking limitations, no trailers may be left in the WBYC parking lot. You will be directed to an offsite lot at a nearby school.
- If you are bringing a large trailer, please let us know when you expect
 to arrive so we can help you unload and manage the traffic flow. Call
 or text 612-597-4479 to provide accurate arrival times for large trailers.
- We will have a limited number of spectator boats available. Sign up for

- Spectator Boats will be available at registration each morning
- Other than Opti's there is no boat launch available at the Yacht Club. Personal boats and coach boats must be launched at the nearby Ramsey Beach.
- Gas will be for sale at Tally's Marina. Please note: No storage of power boats will be allowed at the White Bear Lake Yacht Club at any time.
 Every effort will be made to provide ample spectator boats for those wishing to get out on the water.
- Note to Adults Monday's party at the Armory does not provide alcohol. Feel free to "BYOB," or visit one of the many establishments in the neighborhood.

LASTLY and MOST IMPORTANTLY, there is an amendment to the Sailing Instructions displaying the trapezoid course to be utilized. This is the USODA version of a trapezoid with areas denoted surrounding the course for spectators and coaches. The course is straightforward - a reach at the top of the course and then a downwind and finish. Familiarize your sailor with the course for the RWB fleet only. Click here to see the registrants but also the official documents for the event. The course diagram is in amendment 1 - right under "register".
