Commodore's Corner

As sailors we usually complain about too little wind. I know the Sunfish, Lasers and Thistles would be adding too much wind to their complaints. Both regattas had overpowering winds that limited the Sunfish/Laser regatta to 1 race and the Thistles had only one race on their second day. Both events had winds of 25 mph plus. We can only hope that the upcoming Yflyer, Kestrel and MC/Finn regattas have more accommodating wind.

Prior to the Thistle regatta 10 members shoveled, carted and dumped two feet of sand and gravel from under the crane. I am always thankful for the effort that dedicated members continually step up to perform. The amazing thing is that of the 10 members that worked very hard for about 3 hours, only 3 of us use the crane. That is true dedication to the club.

New stickers are on a table inside the house, so make sure to place them on your boat, trailer, or dolly. As of Wednesday 6/22, there were still 40 members that have not placed their stickers appropriately. Lenny Lerner (FL Grounds) and Charlotte Osborne (Vice Commodore) are going through the lawn, boat park, racks and meadow to remove unstickered boats to the meadow. This is a huge amount of work that would not be necessary if everyone co-operates. Also, the racks north of the race shed are for the exclusive use of the members using the mooring field for their dinghies to get to their moorings.

The Sailing School has started operations under the canopy this year instead of the pole barn. This is due to the limited staff. If you think that you can be of assistance, contact Mark Welcome. I know the Mark can always use the help.

The racing program is running along as usual on Sunday afternoons and Wednesday nights. The program has begun a trial of the Mark Bots which will run for a month. The bots are motorized marks that use GPS to hold their positions without anchors.

Last year we built a lift to assist retrieving or storing boats on the first tier of the racks. You start by placing the fixed wheels in a position that allow you to just turn the lift into the desired spot and push it against the rack. Make sure that you are clear of the boat on the ground and any kayaks above. Retrieve the boat, pull forward enough to turn and clear the boat on the ground, lower and remove.

Reminder from the Board Regarding Boats on the Lawn

Reminder for members who keep their boats on the lawn: Please limit the number of boats per row to 9 boats total, including the 4 boats under the kayak rack in your calculation. It is true that rows to the north hold fewer boats, and rows at the south can hold a bit more, so use your best judgement.

If you are not frequently using your boat, it would be courteous to use one of the spaces under the kayak rack. Your boat must have a sticker for identification, and tires on your dolly must be inflated in order for the caretaker to move your boat when mowing the lawn.

Your boat will be moved to the meadow if it lacks identification or inflated tires. The club has a pump you can borrow. It's located in the back room of the barn on the top shelf.

They have been successfully trialed at the Thistle Regatta and in the heavy wind they held firm. We are using them for regattas and regular club races.

SAFETY ON THE WATER AT SLSC

Rescuing a Person in the Water (PIW)

The weather this season has included cool temperatures and high wind days. High winds are challenging for all of us who sail and sometimes we capsize our boat or even fall overboard.

The priority if you need to rescue a capsized boat are the sailors.

As you <u>approach from down-wind</u>, evaluate the situation, determine how many people are in the water and if anyone is injured. If someone is injured, evaluate if additional help is needed and call for it. If you think the injury may be serious, call 911 also.

The fundamental action of rescuing a person is to keep the engine as far away from the person as possible and move slowly but efficiently.

The very important step is to turn off the engine immediately upon obtaining positive contact and control of the person in the water (PIW) and <u>PULL The Key.</u>

This eliminates the possibility for a running engine to injure the PIW.

Please remember, it is now the law to use the Emergency Cutoff Switch Lanyard while driving our (any) powerboats so equipped.

Becoming Familiar With SLSC's Powerboats

There are three webpages posted on the club website to schedule powerboat handling familiarization. Record if you have taken the familiarization program and record if you have a NY State Boater Safety Certificate or the equivalent (NASBLA-approved) from another agency.

Please go to the club website, click on News and Events, then Boater Safety Instruction for the three sheets where you can find an instructor and enter your information.

Laser & Sunfish Derby SLSC, June 4, 2022

It is always a good idea to start listening to the weather forecast a few days before a race to get an idea of what the conditions will be. Sometimes, it is discouraging because the prediction is for little or no wind, but occasionally the information is for strong winds. The forecast for our combined Laser and Sunfish regatta this year was strong winds. Frequently, they do not develop until well into the afternoon and we can get in a few reasonable races before things get too wild. This year was different. We launched the boats in about 12-14 mph and sailed out to the course. Not unreasonable, unless you weighed less than 120 lbs. The Lasers got off to an interesting start because the timer box malfunctioned. But all the boats were at or behind the line and despite the lack of the usual signals, the start was good. The RC wisely let it go and the Lasers were off and racing. The Sunfish start was done manually with a horn and that worked well. The course was an "F" and by the time the Sunfish were going up the second windward leg, the winds were into the low 20+ mph range. This proved really challenging for everyone, no matter what their skill level. Several of the Sunfish capsized but the mark-set boats were ready and close by to help. Racing for the Sunfish fleet was wisely abandoned after the race. The Lasers went on to two more very exciting and grueling races. Everyone made it back to the club safely as did all the boats. The entire Race team on the water did very well keeping track of skippers and boats and providing support as needed.
